Dear Doctor:-

Since receiving your letter of the 20th and the interesting report that came with it we have discussed among ourselves the questions raised by the information you have sent us.

We have very much appreciated the opportunity of calling upon your organization for information and help in solving some of the industrial medical questions that arise in our operations. We should regret very much any developments that would interfere with our being able to bring to your organization similar questions and problems that may arise in the future.

The problems in our company which are peculiar to our line of business are, however, common to our entire industry and it seems to us undoubtedly true that other units of our industry would be happy to avail themselves of the information they could obtain from your organization if they were made aware that such information is available. We imagine also that the same situation prevails with other individual companies and the lines of business in which they are engaged.

We also feel that it will be a real asset to industry if medical students are given the special training in industrial medicine that you are in position to offer. It seems to us that it is only a question of time before industry will feel the need of men of such training as it now feels the need of men who have advanced training in the subjects of engineering, chemistry, biology and the various sciences, the use of which are essential in modern industry. It seems to us, however, that it is the obligation of the University of Cincinnati, or this particular department of the University of Cincinnati, to formulate some plan which when presented to industry will form a definite program for accomplishing the highly desirable results covered in your report.
