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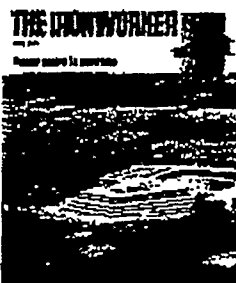

During World War II, one of the materials workers used to build this ship was asbestos. Nobody knew it then, but breathing asbestos dust can cause serious lung diseases including cancer. Sometimes it takes 30 years or more for asbestos-related diseases to show. Millions of workers in construction, mining, and parts of the auto industry involved in brake and clutch installation and repair may have been exposed, too.

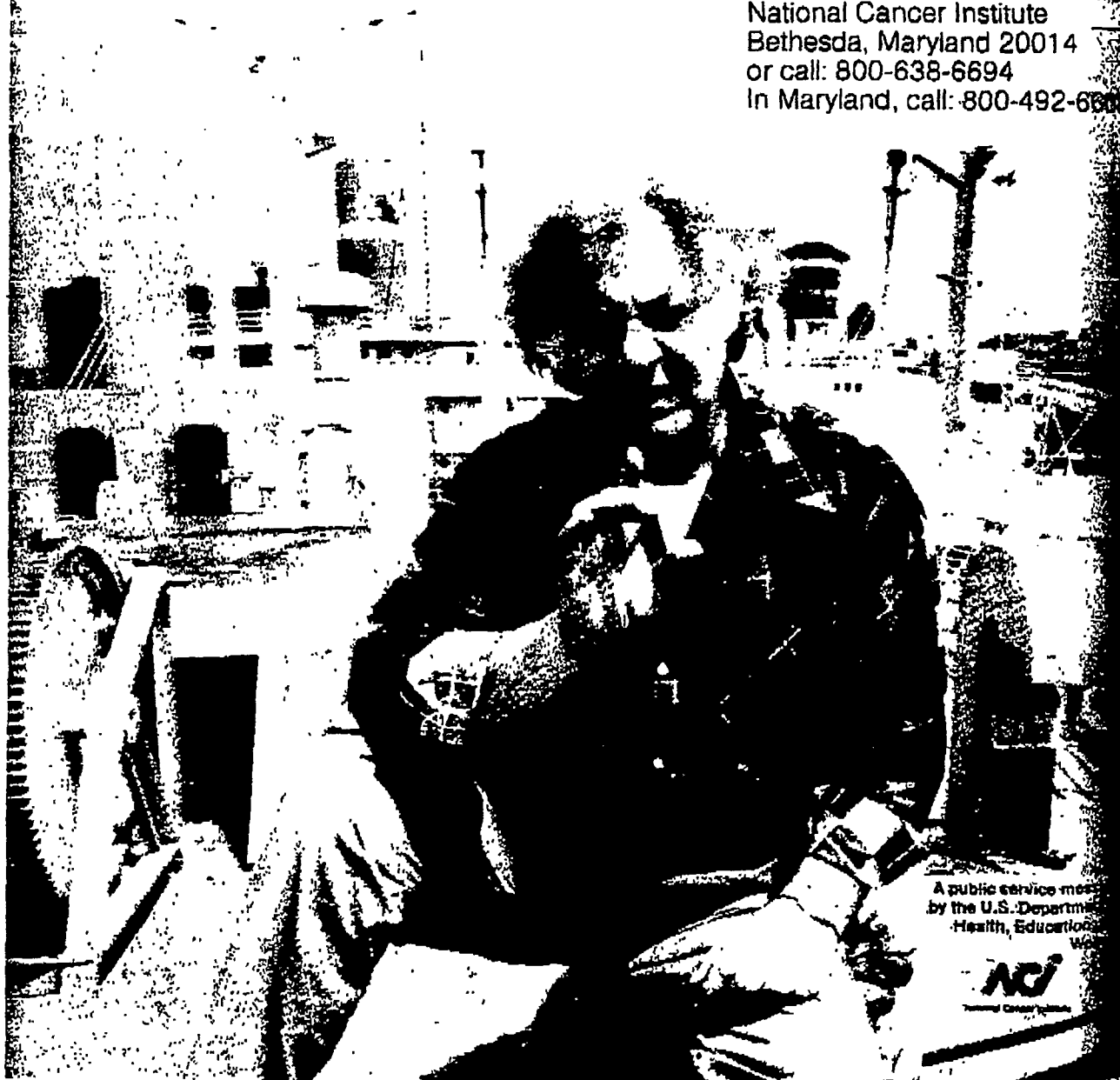
If you think you're one of them, here's what you should know:
