Asbestos firm set own fibre standards

George Barge, president of Atlas Asbestos Co., says "a large number" of his 365 employees have asbestos-related diseases, but the company has spent \$400,000 since 1970 to eliminate the cause of such diseases.

In a letter submitted to Judge Rene Beaudry, head of a government inquiry investigating safety conditions in the asbestos industry, Mr. Barge said that since 1970, his company has worked to reduce the asbestos fibre count to two fibres per cubic centimetre of air.

"We undertook, as responsible managers, a self-imposed lower standard of two fibres per cubic centimetre and we have attained that standard," Mr. Barge wrote in the letter, a copy of which was obtained by THE MONTREAL STAR.

Mr. Barge complained that the testimony of former company physician Dr. Philippe Landry led to "misunderstandings" and "misleading publicity."

Dr. Landry had told the government inquiry, set up to determine

whether the government proposal for an asbestos limit of five fibres per cubic centimetre of air as of 1973 was adequate, that asbestos-processing industries should limit fibres to two fibres per cubic centimetre.

Quebec has no fibre limit. Asbestos dust fibres inhaled during long periods of time produce lung-scurring known as asbestosis that can cause death and can lead to other diseases, including cancer.

Without naming Atlas Asbestos Co., Dr. Landry had said that between 1967 and 1974, he had examined 434 employees at a company with which he was associated. He said 15 of 18 employees who died within that period suffered from asbestos-related diseases, including cancer, and another 130 were placed on workmen's compensation for asbestos-related diseases.

Latest figures show 139 Atlas employees receive workmen's compensation.

Mr. Barge complained in his letter that his company was "fairly identified" by Dr. Landry's testimony as the place where the workers died and the impression given by the testimony was that Atlas has "no real concern about the health of its employees, and this is not true."

"I refer you to Mr. Philippe Duval and Dr. Fernand Gregoire, officials of the Quebec Workmen's Compensation Commission who are aware of our deep concern and activities to improve health standards in our plant."

"With the evidence of our achievements in dust control, we resent any implication of apathy towards the health of Atlas employees..." he said.

Mr. Barge added that industry knowledge of the asbestos hazards and control methods had "not been too far advanced" before 1970 when the firm undertook its control measures.

He said the firm agreed with most recommendations Dr. Landry had made to the commission, including medical examinations of workers, an asbestos dust limit of two fibres per cubic centimetre for the type of asbestos-cement manufacture done by his Montreal firm, visits by government inspectors and availability of air-test results to workers.

These are already in effect, he said, adding that the company took 411 dust counts in 1974, and 377 so far this year.

None of these counts was over five fibres per cubic centimetre and most were under two fibres, he said.

The company president said his firm uses Chrysotile and Amosite asbestos, not Crocidolite asbestos, in its manufacturing processes.

Chrysotile, while asbestos, is considered the least dangerous asbestos fibre and is the only one mined in Quebec, according to the Quebec Asbestos Mining Association. Crocidolite, blue asbestos, is considered the most dangerous and amosite, brown asbestos, is between the two, according to studies quoted in an association brief to the Beaudry committee.

Mr. Barge said his company has no evidence Amosite is more dangerous than Chrysotile but if so, it will be eliminated.
