Fraser, prime minister of New
Zealand, is visiting Washington,
and if he isn't as much at home

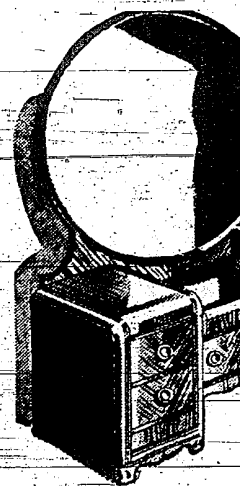
