Mr. Tawney, of Minnesota, and Mr. Liver of Iowa, presented a minority report recommending that the resolution be adopted. At the request of Mr. Cook, of Wisconsin, action on the reports were postponed for one week.

Mr. Corliss, of Michigan, chairman of the committee on election of president, vice-president and representatives in congress, called up the joint resolution for a constitutional amendment to disqualify polygamists for election as senators and representatives in congress, and prohibiting bigamy and polygamous cohabitation between the sexes.

After a short debate it was referred to the committee on judiciary.

In the debate preceding the reference, Mr. Corliss said that while considering the Roberts case had established a precedent which would be followed at all times, it was deemed well that there should be a constitutional amendment to make it possible to use any means of extinguishing the evil of polygamy by making it unlawful in any place, and extending the jurisdiction of the United States so as to cover prosecutions in this particular case.

A FRESNO MURDERER.

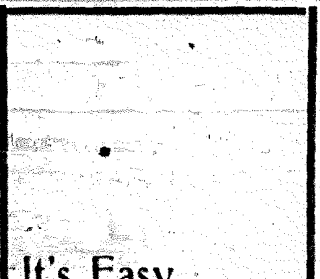

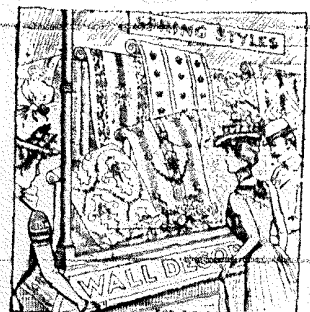
