My only suggestion, relates to the manner of referring to the data. I hesitate to make such a suggestion, since it involves linguistic criticism, but since you asked for it I hope I may, without discourtesy, give vent to "sensitization" to the "jargon" of industrial toxicology. If this should be even slightly offensive, I sue humbly for forgiveness, for I have no such intention. I would put your reference in some such terms as the following, "Data indicative of various degrees of non-hazardous and hazardous exposure to lead among adults." My objection is mainly the elimination of the use of the term "exposures," which is much abused, especially in its plural form..

Dear Dr. Kehoe:

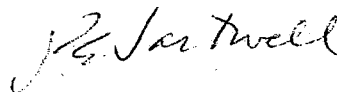
