Dear Mr. Maclean:

I have your letter of September 21st, and I have previously heard from Mr. Hall that a case on which my services might be required was in the offing. I shall make it a point to give you such assistance as is possible, but in as much as this is an extremely busy season of the year for me, I can not afford to spend a single day more than is absolutely necessary. Accordingly I shall plan to be in Raleigh, North Carolina, but I should appreciate it very much if you would make such plans with your colleagues and with such medical associates as you have in this case, so as to save my time. Moreover it seems to me advisable for you to send me in the meantime such information as will permit me to assist you in some measure through correspondence before I arrive on the scene. Knowing nothing of the facts, I am not in a position to express an opinion as to whether the technical aspects of this case are easy of solution. Nor can I tell you whether I shall be able to appear in the case. I have every willingness to give you all the assistance of which I am capable in the interests of establishing the facts and probabilities as to the nature of the case, but I can not venture into it sight unseen, nor can I afford to spend two or three days in North Carolina waiting for an opportunity to be of service to you.
