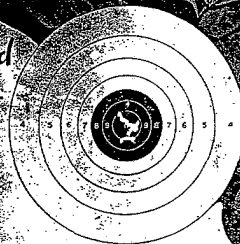

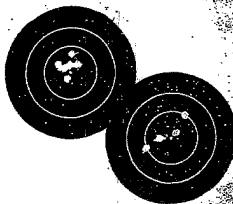

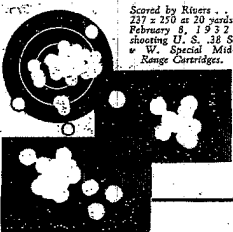
*Here are a few targets punctured by
