June 10.

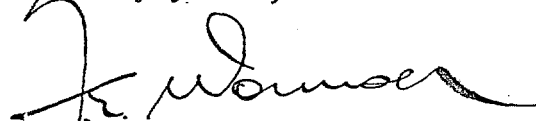
