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APPROVAL OF MINUTES

A motion was made, seconded, and passed

That the Minutes of the Meeting of May 16, 1967, as bulletined
by the Association, be approved.

TRAFFIC COMMITTEE REPORT

In Chairman Wallner's absence, J.M. Barnhart read the Committee Report as
follows:

"This has been a frustrating year for the Traffic Committee. The
general trend has been to increase freight rates, both rail and truck, and
with light density commodities there is not too much defense that can be
offered to forestall increases.

In January the National Truck Classification Board proposed the can-
cellation of most insulating material items and instead proposed ratings based
on density. The proposal follows:

We had a Traffic Committee meeting to discuss this and determined that
we required industry figures which were very competently collated by our Ex-
ecutive Secretary, Mr. Barnhart, and we thank him for his help.

A hearing was held in Washington on this subject and we feel that we
have defeated the density program, however we did not come out unscathed be-
cause I believe we must assume that where we are not paying \$1.25 per 100
pounds we will in the near future be paying \$2.00 per 100 pounds on less than
truckload shipments. While this is a rather substantial increase on a lot of
products, we feel that we have kept the increase to a very minimum.

Shortly after this the trucklines filed a proposal to publish density
ratings on any product weighing less than six pounds per cubic foot as fol-
lows:

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Less than 1 pound	Three times Class 500
1 pound but less than 2 pounds	Class 500
2 pounds but less than 3 pounds	" 400
3 pounds but less than 4 pounds	" 300
4 pounds but less than 5 pounds	" 250
5 pounds but less than 6 pounds	" 200

This proposal would have meant that where we now pay \$1.25-per 100 pounds if the density of the product was less than 1 pound per cubic foot we would pay \$15.00 per 100 pounds, less than 2 pounds per cubic foot \$5.00 per 100 pounds, etc. Fortunately, we have been able to have this suspended by the Interstate Commerce Commission and I consider it very doubtful that it will be approved.

While there are many other subjects concerning cleaning cars, demurrage and so forth none of these have really come to pass. There is one thing, however, which has been on the docket for several years concerning mineral wool cement.

One of our competitors describes his mineral wool cement as high temperature bonding mortar. His cement is no different than ours, however, he advertises, invoices, describes it on the bill of lading and marks his packages as high temperature bonding mortar. For this reason he has been able to get away with what is considered a very improper practice. All of us could do the same thing, however, we all realize that mineral wool cement is mineral wool cement and not high temperature bonding mortar. One of our non-member competitors has filed several proposals requesting reduced rates on mineral wool cement with minimum weights of 70,000 and 100,000 pounds which are not practical minimum weights for our type business. The rates also are higher than those on high temperature bonding mortar. While your meeting is in session I will be in San Francisco at which time I will discuss this matter with the traffic executives of the Southern Pacific, Santa Fe, Western Pacific and Union Pacific Railroads. I will impart to them that while a reduction is welcome this is not the end of our fight to have parity with high temperature bonding mortar in every instance. This could result in one of three things, either we would get high temperature mortar rates on mineral wool cement, or the carriers would turn down our proposal or start an investigation to correct the situation which is now practiced by several of our competitors.

There is another alternative. I believe we could force the discontinuance of the use of high temperature bonding mortar as a description if we want to the Interstate Commerce Commission in a formal procedure. This would require, however, thousands of dollars of time, the requirement of expert witnesses impartial to insulation industry, and probably \$50,000 in legal fees in order to accomplish this objective.

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I do not recommend this last suggestion and believe the matter should be left in the hands of the Traffic Committee to work out the best possible rates and minimum weights to be able to more effectively compete with our competition.

May I thank Jack Barnhart for his very kind assistance and the very able and enthusiastic support of all the members of the Traffic Committee."

REPORT ON NIMA NEWSLETTER PROJECT 1967

Purposes

1. To improve relationships with IDCNA members by informing them of NIMA purposes and programs.
2. To provide useful information on mineral insulations.
3. To maintain contact with other organizations in construction and process industries to keep them aware of NIMA purposes and programs.
4. To identify NIMA and its purposes and programs with individual engineers, architects, contractors and owners.

Form and Frequency

Two page newsletter published four times in the year.

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Distribution

1. 1000 copies inserted at advertising rates in IDCNA NEWS four times in the year.
2. Individual copies mailed to officers of identifiable organizations with common interests, like AIA, Consulting Engineers Council, ASHRAE, ARI, IRR, etc.

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3. Individual copies mailed to editors of industry media, like Heating Piping and Air Conditioning, Chemical Engineering, District Heating, etc.

Budget & Expenditures

The newsletter project was budgeted at \$750.00 per issue for 1967, that amount to cover the cost of advertising in IDCNA NEWS at a rate of \$160.00 per issue, the cost of art, photography, typography, printing and mailing, estimated at \$290.00 per issue, plus the agency fee for gathering the information, writing the copy, clearing it and supervising production and distribution, estimated at 2 mandays per issue or \$300.00. Distribution of individual copies as well as the size of the newsletter has been necessarily limited by the budget.

The first two issues have been produced within the budget as was agreed.

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Out-of-pocket costs to the agency on the first issue came to \$525.00, allowing the agency a fee of \$225.00 to cover preparation costs.

The second issue had a larger print order but art and printing costs were cut by 25%; the balance remaining to cover agency preparation costs should be \$275.00. Since the agency's actual time input on the second issue was cut by one-third, the fee is approaching the actual time cost.

REPORT ON NIMA DUCT SYSTEMS PUBLICITY PROGRAM

Purpose

To increase acceptance of fibrous glass duct systems in commercial, industrial and educational building markets by demonstrating acceptance by contractors, engineers and owners.

Program & Accomplishments

1. ASHRAE Speech: draft prepared in April, 1967 for presentation in February, 1968.
2. Kettering Laboratory Erosion Study: text and illustrations prepared for report now being issued by Kettering with copies available for distribution in October.
3. A technical article on the same subject will be prepared by J. Cholak of Kettering using the same text as a basis.
4. AMERICAN ARTISAN: This magazine has scheduled a 4-part, 8 to 12-page series of articles on fibrous glass duct. The series will include articles on:
 - a. the fibrous glass duct installation in West Elementary School, Elgin, Illinois;
 - b. the fibrous glass duct installation in Sundstrand Aviation Research Building, Rockford, Illinois;
 - c. how Northlake Engineering integrated fibrous glass duct fabrication into its sheetmetal shop;
 - d. how the new Lockformer fibrous glass duct fabricating machine performs.

This series, originally scheduled for September, is now scheduled for November according to the editor, James Wilder, the delay caused by delays in the Sundstrand installation and collection of data on the Lockformer equipment being used on that job.

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5. **AIR CONDITIONING, HEATING & VENTILATING:** this magazine has scheduled a special issue on fibrous glass duct systems to appear in February, 1968. The issue will be based on the conference held September 20, 1967 sponsored jointly by ACEV and NIMA. The conference was attended by 30, including architects, engineers and contractors from across the country along with owners -- GSA, Tishman Realty, and Western Electric. The issue will cover all aspects from design to installation in a series of bylined articles by NIMA members, engineers, contractors and owners on their experience with the material.
6. **HEATING, PIPING & AIR CONDITIONING:** an engineering article bylined by L. A. Bihler, chief mechanical engineer, The Engineers Collaborative, has been proposed and accepted. The article has been outlined and is being developed with Mr. Bihler's assistance; completion is expected within the next 60 days with publication early in 1968. The article will cover the experience Mr. Bihler has had in the design of 10 buildings using fibrous glass duct systems.
7. **SNIPS:** a story on Sundberg Engineering's experience with fibrous glass duct systems in an office building and two high speed trains is being prepared. Publication has not been scheduled as the text is still being cleared with Mr. Sundberg.
8. **AIR CONDITIONING, HEATING & REFRIGERATION NEWS:** The experience of Gary Sheetmetal Co. in the installation of fibrous glass duct in a church has been developed into an article now under review by the firm. Scheduled for publication in November, 1967.

Projects still under development:

9. **Jamesville-DeWitt School:** this installation was visited and the design engineer interviewed with R. McDermott, associate editor of ACEV. It will probably serve as one example in the magazine's special issue but a second version has been discussed with HEATING & AIR CONDITIONING CONTRACTOR.
10. **Fire Marshall Survey:** the survey results will be developed into a feature under Mr. Platzker's byline with his permission.

Budget and Expenditures

This program was budgeted at \$8000.00 for the year. To date approximately 80% of the funds have been spent, \$869.00 for out-of-pocket costs such as travel and photography and \$5680.00 for agency fees to cover 38 man-days expended on the program. The agency estimates that the projects under development will be completed within the budget allotted.

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HEALTH & SAFETY COMMITTEE REPORT

Dr. L. B. Grant reported as follows:

COMMITTEE MEETINGS.

The Committee met on June 5, 1967 and August 10, 1967. The Minutes of the meetings are attached. The highlights of these meetings are as follows:

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Appropos the NIMA Board action directing this Committee to proceed with the U.S.P.H.S. in the initiation of a study of the mineral fiber industry, meetings were held with Dr. Lewis J. Cralley. Dr. Cralley proposed that the first phase of the study should be a study of the causes of death on former long-term employees of the industry using Bureau of Old Age Survivors Insurance Records to determine if trends are evident in specific causes of death in contrast to that of the general population or in the life expectancy pattern. Each of the companies represented by NIMA have now provided information to the U.S.P.H.S. concerning the availability of employment and personnel records from which a cohort will be established for the study. A letter dated September 14, 1967 from Dr. Cralley which is attached is the U.S.P.H.S. official reply to NIMA's request for the mineral fiber industry study.

Appropos the NIMA Board action placing the Educational Program for the IDCNA under this Committee with a recommendation that a follow-up program be formulated, Mr. Clifford Sheckler was appointed by the Committee to chair an Education Subcommittee to carry out the Board recommendation. While this Subcommittee has not as yet finalized the program it will recommend, an interim report per telephone on September 14, 1967 from Mr. Sheckler indicated that the Subcommittee had met several times. An outline of the subjects to be presented include:

- 1) Environment and health;
- 2) Workmen's compensation and legal liability;
- 3) Insurance at present.

The Committee is developing the detailed data on these subjects to be presented. The length of the presentation will be held to less than two hours; a handout is being prepared which will supplement the program. There is an urgent need on the Subcommittee for a person knowledgeable in insurance and workmen's compensation aspects. There is also a need for at least one additional person to be available to make the presentations at IDCNA Regional Meetings. The next meeting of the Subcommittee is tentatively set for December. Mr. John Vyverberg met with Mr. Ted Brody in Montreal in July. Mr. Brody is the National Insulation Contractors Association's Chairman of the Occupational Health Committee, and it was agreed that the oncoming Educational Program will be a cooperative effort between the two groups.

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Dr. W. Clark Cooper met with the Committee on August 10 and discussed his studies and educational efforts in regard to the potential environmental health problems of the insulation workers on the West Coast. Dr. Cooper has U.S.P.H.S. Grant support for his studies. The nature of the studies is similar to those being done by Dr. I. J. Salikoff on the East Coast insulation workers. Dr. Cooper expressed his thoughts in regard to appropriate measures that should be taken to protect the health of the insulation worker. He is recommending to the Board of Trustees appointed to manage the Union's Research Fund that they use the money to educate the worker concerning measures he can take to adequately protect his health from potential environmental hazards. It was the unanimous opinion of those present at the August 10 meeting that to the degree it was feasible the educational efforts of NIMA and Dr. Cooper's group should not be in conflict.

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A meeting of the Committee has been called for October 10 in Pittsburgh for those Committee members who will be attending the Annual Industrial Hygiene Foundation Meeting at Chatham Center. It will be a luncheon meeting.

RECENT SIGNIFICANT PUBLICATIONS

Parallel information in two recent scientific papers indicate what may in time prove to be a significant breakthrough in both the understanding of pathological conditions now attributed to the inhalation of asbestos dust and also the prevention of these effects. Summaries of these articles are attached. One is by L. J. Cralley, et al., entitled "Exposure to Metals in Manufacture of Asbestos Textile Products" and the other by Paul Gross, M.D., et al., entitled "Experimental Asbestosis." Both papers allude to the significance of airborne levels of nickel and other metals which are known or suspected carcinogens associated with asbestos dust inhalation. Both suggest the strong possibility that some of the pathological effects observed may be attributed not to the asbestos but to the metals inhaled simultaneously. This suggests that prevention of these effects may be related to the reduction in metal content of the asbestos.

REMARKS OF LEGAL COUNSEL

John Boyer reviewed the legal status of voluntary standardization under the antitrust laws, noting the instances where Congress has imposed legislative standards after industry delayed in adopting voluntary standards on safety, performance or disclosure. Mr. Boyer further outlined the legal

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requirements under the Trademark Laws and under the antitrust laws of certification programs based on voluntary industry standards. He concluded that standards and certification programs, if carefully initiated and operated in compliance with legal requirements, serve a useful purpose in facilitating trade and by informing and protecting buyers and consumers.

There being no further business, the meeting was adjourned.
