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R.M. ROWE DIES SUDDENLY

Reginald M. Rowe, assistant manager, Atlantic branch, and brother of Harold Rowe, vice president of the Company, died yesterday afternoon in Beekman St. Hospital, New York, following a heart attack suffered earlier in the day at the Company offices. He was 54 years old.

Mr. Rowe was a son of the late Reginald P. Rowe, who for many years was a vice president of National Lead Company and manager of the Atlantic branch. Following his graduation from Princeton in 1910, he went to work in the Atlantic factory. Later, he was transferred to the Crooke Works and then to the Bradley Works where he became superintendent. In 1925, he entered the Atlantic linseed oil sales department and, eight years later, was made sales manager of dry pigments. He was appointed assistant manager of the branch in 1939.

During the World War, Mr. Rowe joined the Naval Aviation Corps, being stationed successively at the Naval Ground School, Boston, the Great Lakes Naval Training Base and Pensacola, Fla.

Mr. Rowe, whose home was in Garden City, L.I., is survived by his widow, Lucia Virginia Rowe, and a son, Reginald M. Rowe, Jr.
