We have gone so far at times as to make life insurance a fringe benefit—to be tacked on to more substantial benefits promised rather indefinitely by a government whose benevolence has to date been exceeded only by its unwillingness to face up realistically to an assured method of raising the money to pay the same benefits.”

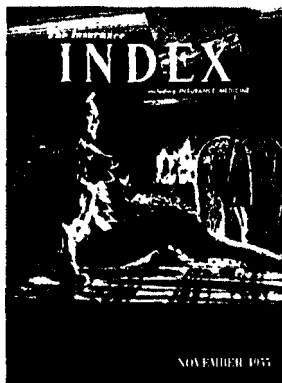
