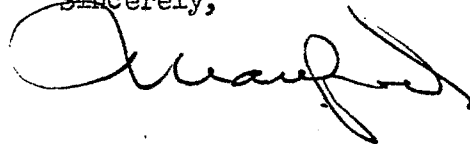
"Lead pipe should never be used for potable water supplies."
