Accommodation

In our last advertisement we pointed out that the eye is a natural lens which automatically focuses for near and distant vision. This is known as Accommodation and is accomplished by the muscles controlling the lens of the eye. Accommodation is greatest in children and decreases as one gets older until at the age of seventy it is often lost altogether.
