Dear Mr. Morey:

I return to you, herewith, the copy of the transcript of my testimony which you sent me, with hand-written corrections which, I hope, will turn out to be legible. The principal difficulty is that in direct speech, one is not as economical and succinct in his expressions as he is when he writes.
