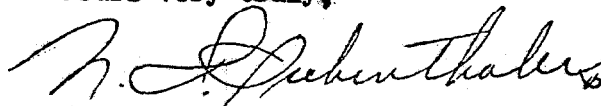

Incidentally, since this man's illness, another man in the same department has also complained of having a similar illness.

I might suggest that at the time one of your doctors makes this contact, he bring along several specimen jars as Captain Dingman thought it advisable that the excreta of these men be analyzed.
