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Nation's Health Perils Growing, U.S. Warns

WASHINGTON—For Americans who pride themselves on doing things right, little comfort can be found in a report by a special task force that checked the nation's health hazards.

The survey—which included a look at Detroit—found that man has created a gigantic mess of living and working conditions. In fact, what the research

revealed was no less than the fact that the federal government spent \$13 billion on a crash program during the past five years to help curb and clean up man's own self-destructive sloppiness.

and excessive noise may be pushing man in the breaking point. In short, the report which was given today in the Department of Health, Education and Welfare (HEW) emphasized that Americans are waging a losing war against themselves—and with success.

"Health and safety will be a major issue in the future," the report said. "The task force, headed

by a former Michigan governor and congressional aide, has been working in eight months of checking by a team which traversed the nation, investigating as listening to experts.

"At the two-thirds point of the 20th century man has discovered that he cannot absorb his surroundings with the abundance of a covenant," the report said.

"For generations it was assumed nature had the ability to absorb an increasing number and variety of environmental pollutants. And for a while it did. Now nature has rebelled."

Although Americans make more things than other people, they also account for more than half the world's trash.

"The year's rubbish alone would fill 30 straws of beer cans stretching from coast to coast," the report said, warning that something else was found for waste than just dumping.

ONE TASK FORCE also suggested that ash collected from smelters could be used in making brick blocks.

"We have a lot of ash to scratch the surface of our wastes," he added.

Otherwise, man will find himself in a world of environmental pits of trash.

The report also told how man's scientific know-how occasionally works against him.

For example, there is concern among scientists that modern auto brake linings may produce lung cancer over long periods of time.

"The linings," the report said, "are a lifesaving technological achievement." But at the same time they increase the public's exposure to asbestos particles as the linings wear.

Russian UN Ploy Sighted

NEW YORK — Diplomatic sources said today the Soviet Union is campaigning privately for Mideast crisis action by the 122-nation United Nations General Assembly, where pro-Arab majorities would enable Moscow to run roughshod over Israel and the West.

Condemnation of Israel for "aggression" and demands that Israel troops withdraw unconditionally from territory seized in the six-day Mideast war would be likely to be endorsed in the Assembly, it is believed.

The Soviet Union does not have the votes to get such a resolution from the 15-nation Security Council, which has been handling the crisis.

MOSCOW'S DEEPER objectives in the move, are seen as these:

• To get propaganda satisfaction for the Arabs, seeing some of their demands in military and giving them reason for new gratitude in Russia for diplomatic support.

• To generate pressure on Israel to withdraw from the Mideast war when Israel's armies were on the march.

The Kremlin's diplomatic informants said, however, a second and more important reason for the move is to get the Mideast crisis on the General Assembly's agenda as a permanent item.

The Assembly is in session on African problems and the Soviet Union is due to adjourn unless given some new work to do.
