### Former Attache Dies

SAN FRANCISCO (AP) — Gen. Philip H. Faymonville, 73, military attaché in Moscow for five years beginning in 1934 after the United States recognized the Soviet government, died Thursday. Gen. Faymonville, who retired from the Army in 1948, returned to Russia during World War II as a lend-lease administrator. He also served as military attaché in Tokyo.

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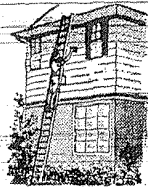
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
