My dear Doctor Wright:

I thank you very much indeed for your letter of November 26th concerning Mr. [REDACTED] whom you saw in consultation with Doctor Johnston of Cannonsburg.

I appreciate very much what you have said and understand fully your situation as consultant in this case.

I shall correspond further with Doctor Johnston about the matter. In his correspondence with me thus far Doctor Johnston appears to be convinced that this case is one of lead poisoning. I, on the other hand, am not convinced one way or the other, and I regard it as unfortunate because of the complications of the matter that an absolutely certain diagnosis can not be made.

In case anything further arises in connection with this case or if I have an opportunity to see him again, I should like very much to have you see him again. It seems quite likely that there will be no further development since Doctor Johnston has informed me that he has apparently made an ineventful recovery.
