Dear Doctor Frampton:-

Please accept my thanks
for your cordiality and frankness on my recent
brief visit to your office.

In accordance with my
promise I am sending you by express a small con-
tainer for the collection of a spot sample of
urine. In as much as the quantities of lead found
in such a sample, under normal conditions, are ex-
ceedingly minute, it is necessary to exercise great
caution in the collection of a sample of urine so
that no contamination from dust of any kind may occur.
Accordingly I am sending you a separate sheet giving
the instructions which we regularly put into effect
for the avoidance of contamination.

I would appreciate it very
much if you would let me know of any further develop-
ments in connection with this case. Moreover if any
similar cases come to your attention, I would be very
grateful to you if you would report them to me promptly.
As I told you, we are interested in the investigation
of all such cases. For obvious reasons we do not barge
in and investigate suspected cases of this type, but we
make our approach through the proper professional
channels. We do hope, however, to know as much about
everything which occurs as possible for only in this
way can we suggest suitable precautionary measures.

Again my thanks for your
courtesy and for your assistance in obtaining some
further information on this man.
