Your Cover Story

Our feature story this month is dedicated to the hundreds of workers who are presently constructing the new Navy destroyer tender, the U.S.S. *Samuel Gompers*. Named in honor of the man who played such an invaluable part in preparing the foundation of the American labor movement, the vessel is due for completion in early 1966.

Pictured on the cover is an artists' conception of the ship. On July 9, officials of government, the Navy, and labor—including our President C. W. Sickles—gathered at the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard to see AFL-CIO President George Meany stamp his initials into the steel plate of the keel and then watched as the great structure was lowered into place. Shown witnessing the keel-laying are (from left) President Hunter P. Wharton, Operating Engineers; President Russell M. Stephens, Technical Engineers; President Russell K. Berg, Boiler Makers; President B. A. Gritta, Metal Trades Department (AFL-CIO); President James A. Suffridge, Retail Clerks; Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz; AFL-CIO President George Meany; Senator Henry M. Jackson; General President C. W. Sickles; and President Peter T. Schoemann, United Association of Plumbers and Pipe Fitters.

In his address, President Meany acknowledged the great and lasting efforts of Samuel Gompers, who worked from his youth until his death in 1924 to see that the rights of laborers both in our country and throughout the world were secured for them. He strived not only for lasting world peace but for the benefits which are in evidence in American labor today—fair wages, reasonable working hours, and acceptable on-the-job conditions. His memory lives on in the hearts of workers everywhere, and it will be further perpetuated in the vessel that will sail the seas bearing his name.

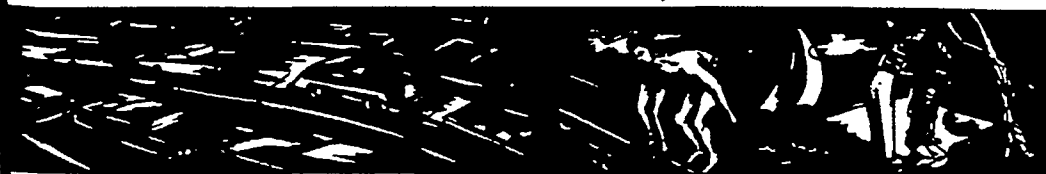

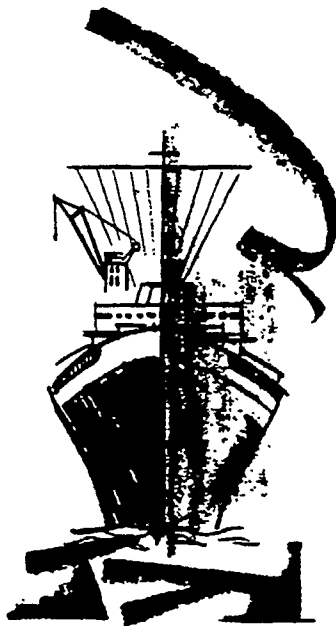
In Honor of Labor's First President

U.S.S. Samuel Gompers Takes Shape in Bremerton, Washington



THE first new destroyer tender to be built in the United States since 1945 is now under construction in the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard in Bremerton, Washington. At ceremonies held on July 9, 1964, General President Carl W. Sickles joined other labor officials in witnessing the laying of the keel of the great vessel, which has been officially named the *U.S.S. Samuel Gompers*.

With the sun shining brightly on the snow-topped Rocky Mountains in the background, AFL-CIO President George Meany, accompanied by Secretary of Labor W. Willard Wirtz and President Paul Warner of the Bremerton Metal Trades Council, stamped his initials into the steel plate of the keel. Looking on were a number of political, Naval and labor officials, as well as some 600 shipyard workers.



Senator Henry M. Jackson (Dem., Washington) was on hand at the keel-laying ceremony to express his pride in the new *U.S.S. Samuel Gompers*, under construction in his home state.



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In his address preceding the actual keel-laying, President Meany said:

"We in the AFL-CIO are deeply proud that this ship will bear the name of the first leader, and to a very great extent, the creator, of the modern American labor movement.

"Samuel Gompers was a man of peace; but he never lost sight of the fact that the preservation of peace—and the security of American freedom—could only be assured by America's strength.

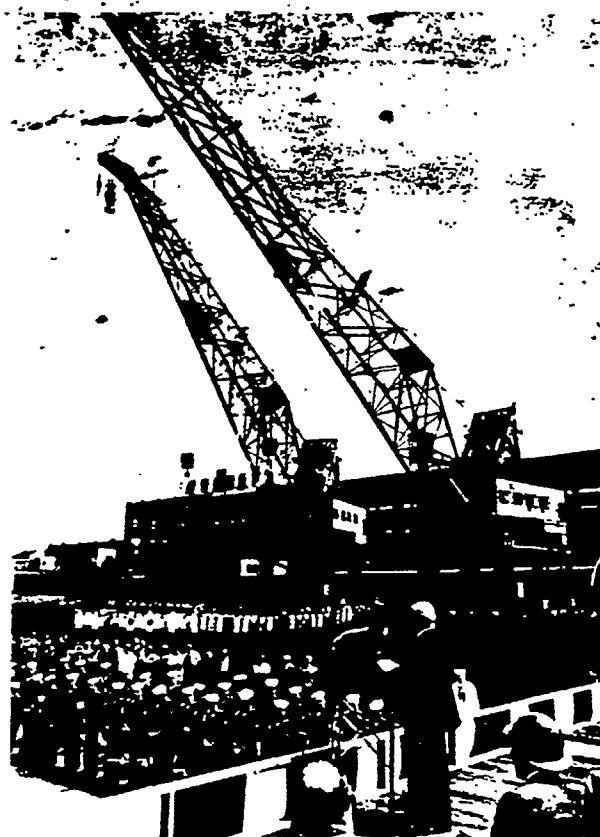
"This knowledge is a part of his heritage to those who have followed him in the American labor movement."

The labor leader continued by warning the assembled audience that we live today in a "much more perilous world" where peace has become more important than even Samuel Gompers could have realized. But he also reminded that peace remains basically dependent on America's strength in every area—social, economic, and military.

"During the next two years," Mr. Meany said, "a ship will rise on this keel, and will become an integral part of this country's defense establishment. . . .

"But let us also hope that during those same two years, the strength of the nation will be building up in other ways." Examples of this increasing strength will be seen in the terms of the new civil rights bill, which hopefully will become "a part of the fabric of American life;" in the successful war on poverty, with its unemployment and low wages; and with the elimination of barriers against educational opportunity.

The naming of the ship in honor of Mr. Gompers is fitting in that he was a man dedicated "to the cause of social and economic justice." During his years as founder and leader of the trade union movement, he fought diligently for the high standards which prevail today—better wages, shorter working hours, improved job conditions. And his fight did not stop there, for he also advanced the causes which would benefit all Americans and strived unceasingly toward the eventual creation of a "true spirit of brotherhood among men of all nations," a goal which remains to be realized.



AFL-CIO President George Meany delivered the main address at the ceremony. He proclaimed Gompers "a man who believed in and worked for peace" but who "knew its best guarantee is the power of self-protection."

Concluding, President Meany noted that, in reality, the new destroyer tender will be a ship of war in the great tradition of the U.S. Navy, where ships have "symbolized American good will and friendship. . . .

"Thus the *U.S.S. Samuel Gompers*, like the man for whom it is named, will symbolize both the nation's de-

termination to safeguard human liberty and its dedication to the cause of human brotherhood."

Preceding President Meany's address, Rear Admiral Floyd B. Schultz, Commander of the Puget Sound Shipyard, introduced Rear Admiral W. A. Brockett, Chief of the Bureau of Ships, Lieutenant Governor John A. Cherberg, and

Senator Henry M. Jackson, all of whom made short statements concerning the occasion.

Following Mr. Meany, the Honorable Victor M. Longstreet, Assistant Secretary of the Navy, presented Honorable W. Willard Wirtz, Secretary of Labor, who conveyed his own and the message of President Lyndon B. Johnson. The Sec-

retary referred to Mr. Gompers as the "principal architect of the free-labor movement in America—President of the AFL for 37 years—co-worker with Woodrow Wilson for peace at Versailles—champion for over half a century of the simple ideal that it is only people that matter."

He concluded by delivering the first entry on the new vessel's log, the message from the President of the United States. Mr. Johnson proclaimed that the ship will bear a proud name and that she will "take to the oceans of the world the reminder that progress is possible only when each free man respects the dignity and the rights of others."

The destroyer tender, scheduled for launching in early 1966, has been designed by the Puget Sound Naval Shipyard to be capable of providing supplies, repairs, and support facilities for all types of destroyers, including support of missile systems and anti-submarine weapons and equipment, advanced communications and electronics systems, and nuclear propulsion plants.

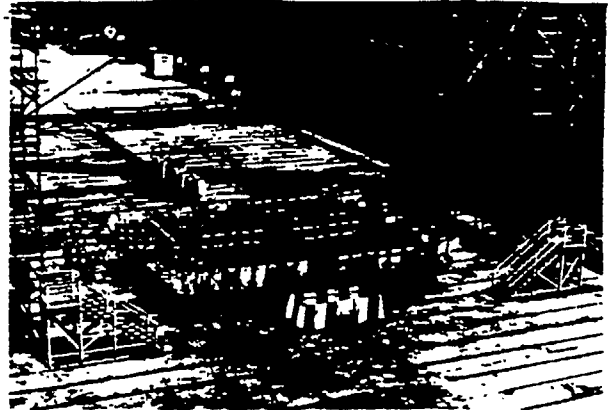
Upon completion, the *Gompers* will have a full-load displacement of 20,500 tons, a length of 644 feet, and a beam of 85 feet. She will travel at speeds in excess of 18 knots and will be powered by engines producing 20,000 shaft horsepower.

One five-inch .38 caliber gun and

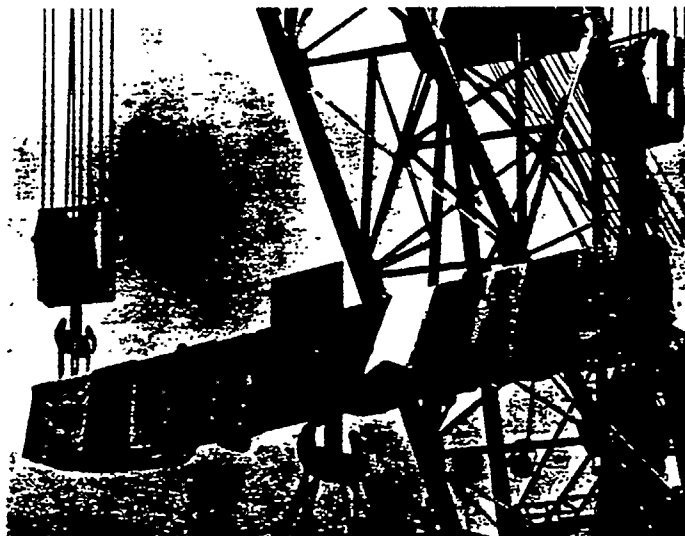
six .50 caliber machine guns for limited self defense will be mounted on the ship. She will carry a crew of 135 officers and 1668 enlisted men.

Destroyer tenders have long been an integral part of the great defense systems of this nation's Navy. The tenders have been called "floating miniature navy yards," since destroyers depend upon them for maintenance, repair, and supplies after they leave the ground shipyard. The *Gompers*, being the first

new tender to be built in 20 years, reflects the overwhelming advancements that have been made in the modern missile-firing destroyers. She will have one crew to operate her and one which will perform repair, supply and medical functions for as many as six guided missile destroyers along side at one time. Her specialty shops will number 52 for repairs in metal, wood, hulls, machinery, canvas, and other areas of ship maintenance. Cranes will be capable of lifting 30 tons; she will

It is fitting that the ship whose keel is being laid today will bear the name of a man who laid the keel for one of this Nation's most significant social institutions, the free trade union movement. Through that movement, Samuel Compers insured for working men and women the basic right of representation that is essential to industrial democracy.

With a vision that looked far into the future, he helped American labor to achieve its objectives, often through hard and bitter times and not without conflict -- but always within the framework of our free enterprise system. He believed firmly that because of our freedoms of association, speech, assembly, and press, his movement was provided with the "opportunity for evolution rather than revolution." He was deeply committed to the preservation and extension of basic human rights -- that we might continue to evolve in a peaceful manner and contain social changes within the framework of law and order.

This ship which will bear his name will be an efficient and capable instrument of defense in a period when the technology of global war has rendered resort to the battlefield the equivalent of universal destruction. Freedom today is engaged on many fronts. Brave men the world over are giving their lives to preserve the liberties of others. Compers knew well that peace may be realized only when freedom remains strong.

The U.S.S. SAMUEL COMPERS will bear a proud name. She will take to the oceans of the world the reminder that progress is possible only when each free man respects the dignity and the rights of others.

Wharton, President of the Washington State Labor Council Joseph Davis, and Chief of Navy Industrial Relations Rear Admiral R. L. Moore, Jr.

Davis-Bacon Revisions Signed into Law at White House

A long-awaited improvement to the original Davis-Bacon Act of 1931 was signed into law on July 2 by President Lyndon B. Johnson. General President Carl W. Sickles was among those invited guests who witnessed the signing at the White House, and he received a pen used by the President in affixing his signature.

The revisions, a feature of modernization which has taken top priority in the legislative recommendations of the Building and Construction Trades Department, will substantially strengthen the bill of 30 years ago. The new law calls for such items as health, welfare and pension provisions in collective bargaining agreements to be considered in computing wages in the

Labor Department's predeterminations. It will apply to Federally-financed construction projects, but not to building which is strictly intrastate.

Senators Hubert H. Humphrey (Dem., Minn.) and Thomas A. Kuchel (Rep., Calif.) led the push for Senate adoption. The amendments had previously passed the House last January by a 357-50 vote, backed by Representative James Roosevelt (Dem., Calif.). The favorable Senate voice vote came shortly after passage of the civil rights bill.

AFL-CIO President George Meany had written a strong personal plea to the Senate before passage, asking for favorable action by that body to destroy the injustice

of the former Act, saying that the employer who does not pay fringe benefits has an obvious and unfair advantage in bidding on Federal construction jobs.

Following passage, Building and Construction Trades Department President C. J. Haggerty praised the action, saying that the new bill represents a great victory for the building trades.

"The new amendments," he said, "are entirely in keeping with the spirit and purpose of the original Davis-Bacon Act."

Section 4 of the new bill provides that amendments take effect 90 days following enactment. This does not apply to contracts which are already in existence or to those made pursuant to bids outstanding.

MORE than 400 people attended the eighth annual Craftsmanship Awards dinner of the Washington Building Congress at the Mayflower Hotel on July 13, 1964. Twenty individual tradesmen and one team composed of three men received certificates of exceptional craftsmanship for outstanding work on buildings in the metropolitan Washington area.

President Sickles, Secretary-Treasurer Hutchinson and Vice President Haas, together with Local No. 24, Washington, D. C., President Sonnefeld and Business Agent Hoyle attended this dinner at which two Local No. 24 members, Brothers Charles P. Hawk and Roland E. Thomas, Jr., received awards for exceptional craftsmanship.

William R. Lockhart, President of the Washington Building Congress, presided at the dinner. Roger E. Allard, Chairman of the Craftsmanship Awards Committee, read the citations as each winner was escorted to the platform by his employer to receive his award. J. C. Turner, President of the Greater Washington Central Labor Council, presented the certificates and gold lapel pins at the dinner. Karel Yasko, Assistant Commissioner for Design and Construction, General Services Administration, was the speaker.

Awards are given to men who have displayed unusual interest, ingenuity and skill in working out commendable solutions left to their discretion in field and shop and/or executed work requiring exceptional skill.

The Washington Building Congress believes that recognition of fine craftsmanship is a very real service to the entire local construction industry. Public recognition of superior craftsmanship is deeply satisfying to a mechanic doing outstanding work at the regular pay rate. The encouragement of fine workmanship improves labor-management and public relations and benefits everyone in the industry.

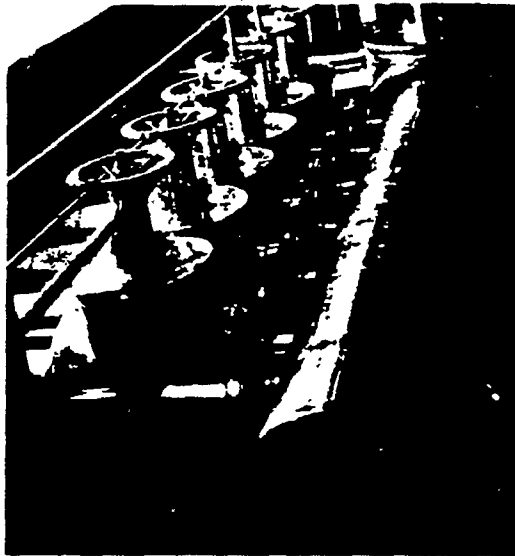

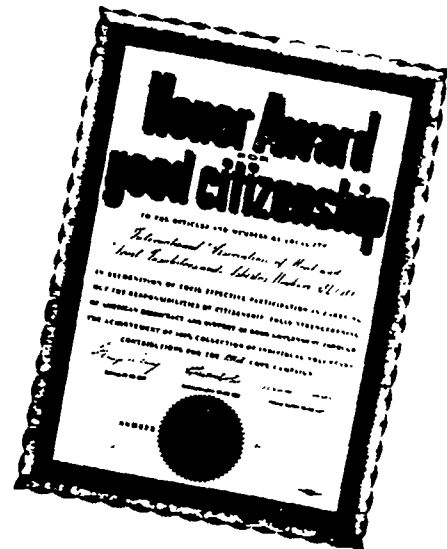

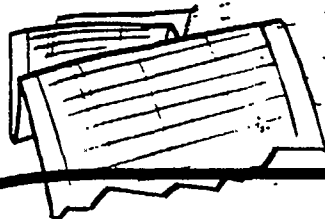

This issue developed as a consequence of several bad experiences on the part of our membership in various localities, where the employers were unable to meet their financial obligations.

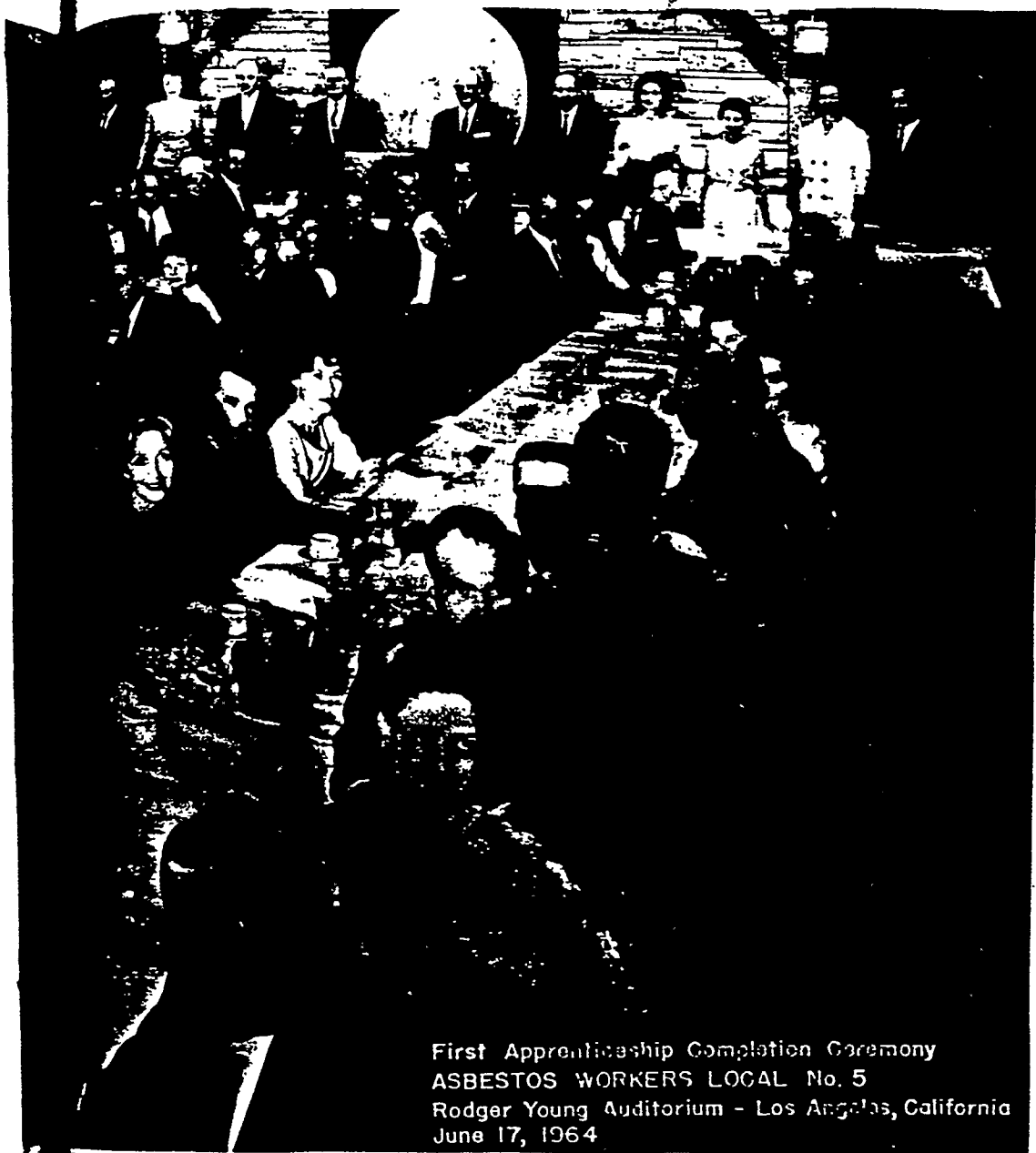

Delegate Eby informed the delegates of the death of one of the members from the disease of Anthrax, reportedly contracted from working with hair felt which contained goat hair imported from Asia and Africa. According to the information received, the imported goat hair was contaminated with Anthrax spores, which can remain dormant for up to 50 years. Members should wear respirators, gloves, and long sleeved shirts when working with hair felt unless first analyzed and found to be free of the Anthrax spores. Should the skin become irritated and a pimple or abcess form, be sure to advise the doctor to check for Anthrax as the cause of the condition.

Delegate Wood stated that four recent deaths and two disabled members of Local 47 were due to Asbestosis. He also informed the delegates that the T. B. Society had agreed to alert their x-ray technicians to look for signs of asbestosis in checking chest x-rays.

President Sickles gave a report on craft conditions as he found them in his travels. He stressed the need for the delegates to follow as closely as possible the recommended form of agreement and to get the advice of the General Office before including any changes of language suggested by the employers. He furthered his remarks by outlining the history of the much disputed Article XI.

Local 46, Knoxville, Tenn., requested that the next Conference meeting be held in Knoxville. Moved and supported that the request be accepted. Motion carried.

Local 41, Fort Wayne, Ind., requested that the Conference meeting being held in the Spring of 1965 be held in Fort Wayne, Indiana. Moved and supported that the request be accepted. Motion carried.

There being no further business, the meeting adjourned.

The keen attention and the applause given Mr. Bullough showed the respect this man well deserves. Mr. Breach has many friends in this Conference, as he has worked with some of our Brothers in one capacity or another for some years. Mr. Breach is being transferred to San Francisco as manager. Mr. Mc-

Caffree expressed his opinion on several matters confronting this industry. In Mr. McCaffree's remarks it was indicated that there is some doubt, from reports he has received, as to the direct relationship between what we call health hazards because of the materials we use in our work each day and the respiratory and cancerous ailments which we feel are directly connected to these materials. Mr. McCaffree concluded however, that there is need for more research on these points.

General President Sickles in a direct rebuttal to Mr. McCaffree's remarks said that evidence beyond a doubt has been established by years of research and study by renowned specialists in this field that our people's life expectancy is greatly reduced because of the materials with which we work. The vast research being done in our industry

and case histories turned over to Dr. Selikoff and his staff, have clearly shown our fears to be justified: The need for further study is mutually agreed upon—but recognition of these hazards by the employer and manufacturer should also be forthcoming.

Communications were read relating to the acceptance of Local No. 135, Las Vegas, Nevada into this Conference. A motion was made, seconded and passed that Local No. 135 be seated with full voice and vote in the Western States Conference.

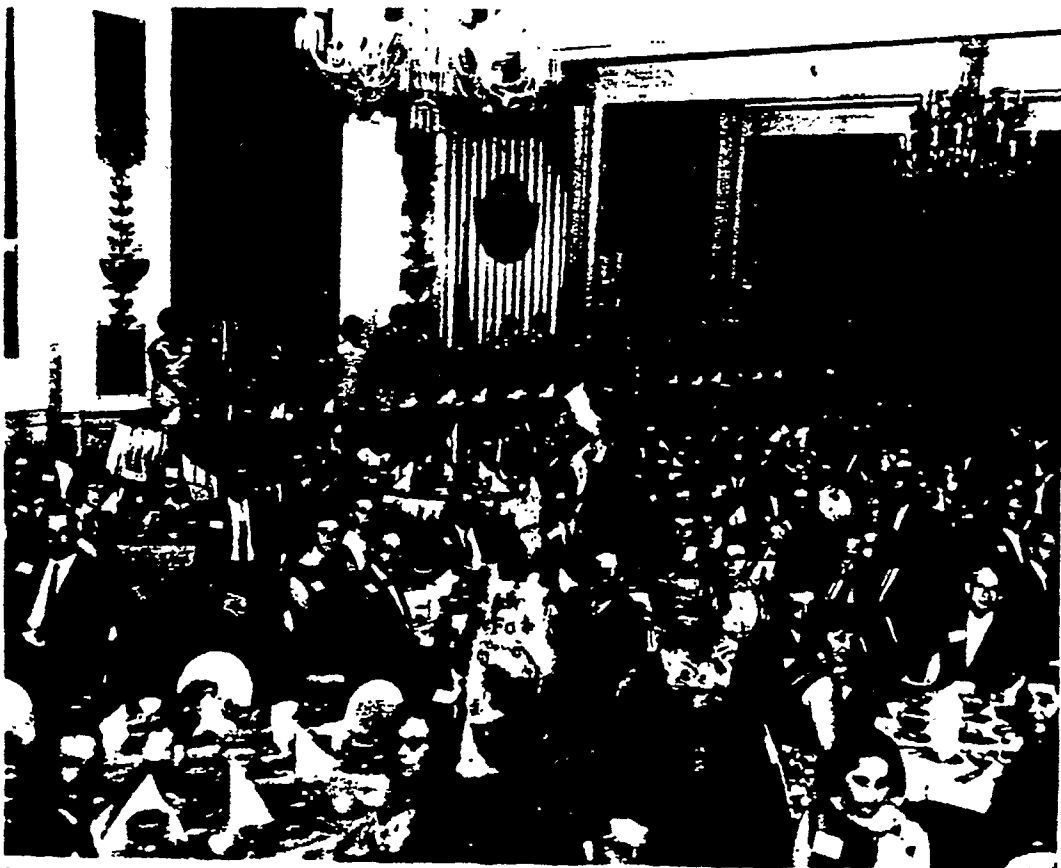

The health hazards of our trade was discussed at length. The lung X-rays on an annual basis was considered. A motion was made, seconded and passed that the officers of this Conference discuss ways and means of setting up an annual ex-

amination for the purpose of detecting occupational diseases.

A discussion was held on the freezing of the Superintendent's past time in the trade in relation to his pension credits. It was pointed out that the Superintendents are covered in general by Article V, Section 3; thus their time is frozen as of the time they left the trade.

A clarification of the problems surrounding Article XI of our International Constitution and By-Laws was given by President Sickles. JUST 1 VOTE

In 1960, John F. Kennedy's national plurality was less than one vote per precinct. He defeated Vice President Nixon by less than 120,000 votes out of almost 69 million votes cast.

In the 1962 elections:

- The Governor of North Dakota was elected by only 2,007 votes
- The Governor of Vermont was elected by only 1,348 votes
- The Governor of Maine was elected by 483 votes
- The Governor of Rhode Island was elected by 398 votes
- The Governor of Minnesota was elected by 91 votes

Less than half of the eligible voters in the United States voted in the 1962 election.

In 1948, President Truman won Ohio by 7,107 votes and California by 17,865. If one Truman voter in each precinct in these states had stayed away from the polls, Gov-

ernor Dewey would have captured 50 more electoral votes. President Truman would have lost 50, and the election would have been thrown into the House of Representatives!
