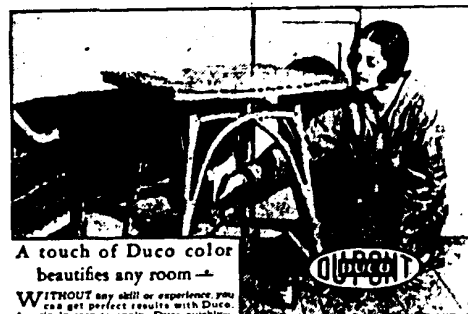

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1100 MUSICIANS IN BAND CONTEST

SACRAMENTO, April 24 (AP).—More than 20 high school bands, comprising about 1,100 youthful musicians, will compete in the Northern California School Band Contest here April 26. In addition to deciding the championship of the northern part of the state, the contest will also determine which bands will go to the national contest in Flint, Mich., May 22.

The contest here will be held under auspices of the Northern California Band Masters' Association under the rules of the National Bureau for the Advancement of Music, which will award prizes to bands winning in each class. In addition a silver cup will go to the band winning the marching contest.

Preliminary to the band contest a solo competition will be held the night of April 25, for which a large number of contestants have entered.

The national trophy is now held by Nicholas Senn High School, Chicago. Northern California was represented in the national contest at Denver last year by the Modesto and Princeton bands, which now hold permanently the trophies for Classes A and B, respectively.

Bands entered for the contest here are: Class A, Watsonville, Sacramento, Bakersfield and Berkeley; Class B, Tracy, Centerville, Vallejo, Yuba City, Woodland, Wilcox and Marysville; Class C, McClelland, Modesto, Livermore, Eugene and Kerman; Class D, Sacramento, Modesto and Berkeley.

POPPIES ARE AMONG "ROYAL FAMILIES"

The poppies are truly one of the royal families of the garden, contributing a brilliancy as well as a delicacy of coloring unrivaled by any other family. It is not as numerous a family as many of those figuring importantly in the garden as there are only about 25 genera and about 115 known species.

By far the most important genus of the family is the poppy itself—botanically, papaver. In the true poppies, we have the Shirley poppies, the scarlet field poppy or Flanders poppy as it has come to be known, the opium poppies, the poppy and carnation flowered annuals of our gardens, the enormous oriental in the perennial border, the silky Iceland poppies and tiny Alpine poppies of the rock garden.

Other less known kinds are the tulip poppy, papaver galicum, and a red poppy known as the Persian poppy.

They are the easiest grown of annuals and one of the hardiest. Close to them in importance are the California poppies which botanically are Escholtzia. They are one of the finest of garden materials and from their original golden yellow color we now have developed a wide range of crimson, pink, and cream tints.

The huge white Matilija poppy or Romneya of California sometimes in favored localities in our colder gardens all consent to dwell and from Asia to the poppies which so far have eluded American conditions are making their way abroad. These are the meconopsis tribe, the huge blue M. Baileyi being favorite but it has proved impractical in American gardens to date.

The bush escholtzia or Hunnermannia is a poppy that deserves wide acquaintance. It is, in effect, an upright California poppy with fine stems for cutting and is easily grown. The California are low growers of spreading habit. The prickly poppies, argemone, are sometimes seen and have beauty of change as well as of flower. They are white with occasional variations of pink and cream tones made attractive by a large mass of golden stamens in the center. They are well worth a trial as a novelty.

IF GROWING TOMATOES, SELECT TWO VARIETIES

Yellow tomatoes, although by no means new, often prove a decided novelty in many communities. Most imposing of all is the yellow Ponderosa, a beautiful tomato to look upon and equally good to eat. It has a distinct flavor and its chief use is to eat raw. It is a rich golden yellow and of the same size and quality as the red Ponderosa which is usually classified as a "purple" tomato. It grows to enormous size.

The yellow and red Ponderosa mixed in a salad offer a pleasing color arrangement.

Another yellow tomato less known than the yellow Ponderosa is the Golden Queen, smaller and of more regular shape than Ponderosa. It is also earlier than Ponderosa. It has the same golden color as the yellow Ponderosa but many connoisseurs will say that the former has the flavor of the yellow Ponderosa.

For the northern states where the growing season is shorter, a new tomato has been bred by the North Dakota Experiment Station of especially early ripening known as Red River. It is a cross of Sunrise and Earliana. It is a popular variety wherever it has been tried for its earliness, the scarlet color of its fruit and the regular and uniform size.

The yellow pear tomato, one of the miniatures of the family, has achieved considerable vogue for preserving as it gives a bright yellow color when cooked that is very attractive.

It will soon be time to get the tomato seed started and the plants growing so that they will be sizeable enough to set out as soon as warm weather arrives. It will be necessary to start seed of the more unusual tomatoes at home. The standard varieties can always be supplied in plants by the seed houses or by market gardeners. Try some of the yellow as a novelty and change from the red varieties.

Select two types of tomatoes, one for canning and one for salads, during the summer months. The round, regularly shaped types are best for salads. The heavier, meatier kinds are more valuable to give canning material. Get ready to grow your tomatoes to stakes this year and keep them off the ground.
