VISALIA FLIER GETS ALEUTIAN POST ON PLEA TO AVENGE BROTHER'S DEATH

AN ADVANCED ALEUTIAN BASE, Sept. 12 (AP)—Delayed—Another of the Todd boys of Visalia was flying in the Aleutian area today, determined to avenge the death of his brother, Capt. Jack F. Todd, killed in the first Army air raid on Kiska last year.

Second Lieut. Rex Todd, 28, who arrived at an advanced base this week, told how his assignment to an 11th Air Force bomber squadron for Aleutian service was something he had long sought.

Lieutenant Todd, son of Mr. and Mrs. R. L. Todd of Visalia, was employed in the Lockheed Aircraft plant in Southern California when the Japanese occupied Kiska and Attu early in June, 1942.

His brother, Captain Todd, was killed June 11 in testing the Japanese invasion. Fellow airman said he was leading the attack and had just opened the bomb bay of his plane when an enemy anti-aircraft shell made a direct hit.

The next day, Rex Todd quit his job at the aircraft plant and applied for appointment as an Army aviation cadet. He was accepted June 18. His constant goal became the Aleutians.

"Before Jack left," Lieutenant Todd said, "he told me he felt he wouldn't be back. He was pretty determined and I halfway believed him. Anyway, I told him if he didn't get back I'd pitch in and see what I could do."

Lieutenant Todd received his wings as a bomber pilot last February 6 but, instead of being sent north, he was assigned to a Texas field as an instructor.

"That job," he said, "I couldn't shake for hell."

"I tried and tried, applied and reapplied to get into combat service and get to my brother's old base. Finally I just had to get there."

Lieutenant Todd said he then managed to route his appeals around Army red tape and his wish was granted. He arrived two days before the Japanese on Kiska, from which they had fled before an American amphibious force last month. But he is eager to smack the enemy on their own Kurile Islands and their homeland proper. Captain Jack, he explained, was

the eldest and his and his other brother, Russell Jr.'s idol. Russell is doing his part to avenge Jack by building bombers at the plant where Rex formerly worked as an engineer.
