Dear Mr. Spore:

As indicated in Mr. Compton's letter of December 31 to you, I have been asked to forward an opinion as to the possible toxicity hazards in using Aroclor 1262 in a linseed oil base printing medium.

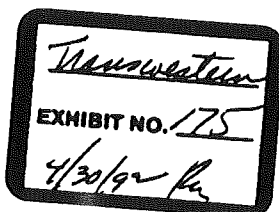
As your original letter indicated, you are aware that care should be exercised in handling all of the Aroclors when these materials are used at elevated temperatures. The hazard of inhalation of Aroclor vapors decreases with the lower vapor pressure of the more highly chlorinated compounds in this series. Thus the possibility of volatilization or release of vapors into the atmosphere when Aroclor 1262 is heated is less than when Aroclor 1232 or 1242 is heated to the same temperature.

The fact remains that I would not recommend the use of Aroclor 1262 at temperatures above 150-160°F without the provision of exhaust ventilation to remove any vapors that might be released. Certainly the glazing and firing operation at a temperature of 2050°F must be done in an oven that has to be ventilated to the outdoors. I would imagine that this would be desirable not only from the standpoint of the control of Aroclor vapors but also from the standpoint of the removal of odors and other decomposition products.

I cannot emphasize too strongly that ventilation control to prevent inhalation is mandatory. One company using a formulation containing an Aroclor for forming and binding inorganic materials has experienced the development of chloracne in a number of workers where adequate mechanical exhaust ventilation was not supplied.
