New York City Paint Law

The adoption of a new labeling law by the New York City Board of Health...

"prohibits the possession, offer, sale or donation in New York City of any paint having more than 1% of lead (determined as available lead based on the total non-volatile content of the paint) unless it carries the warning statement 'CONTAINS LEAD. DANGEROUS IF EATEN. DO NOT APPLY ON TOYS, FURNITURE OR INTERIOR SURFACES WHICH MIGHT BE INEARED BY CHILDREN,' and in addition the words 'Caution,' 'Warning,' or 'Danger' appear on the label or container. The warning statement may use the words 'or other compounds' following the words 'Contains Lead.'

New York City Paint Law Cont.

"The new regulation adopts the Association's recommendations on precautionary labels which relate to harmful metal compounds.

"Marine paints, roof coatings and roof cements are fully exempt. Automotive finishes not sold at retail are excluded."

The law becomes effective May 1, 1955, with necessary stickers attached to cans on shelves or in stock. Technical Service is preparing a list of products affected by the new label law, with special consideration of products containing Chrome Pigments where reformulation would be necessary to avoid the stickers or special labeling.
