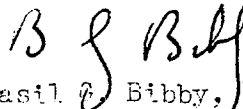

We are preparing some articles for publication, giving the results of the studies of Dr. Machle and his associates, on the Metabolism of Fluoride Administered to Human Subjects under a Variety of Conditions. These results would indicate that such quantities of fluoride as you are dealing with are of little or no hygienic significance.
