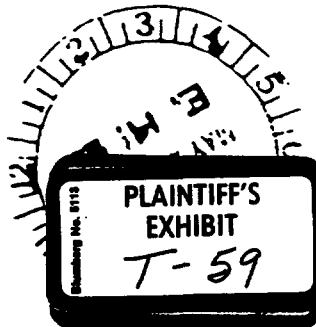

Dear Mr. Jeffords:

Inclosed herewith you will find a copy of a paper containing the results of the study conducted at your plant in March of this year.
