

Will Be School Board Candidate

Reginald Foster, Pacific Grove city attorney, today announced his candidacy for the Pacific Grove board of school trustees. With yesterday the final day for filing Foster entered his petition late yesterday afternoon in Salinas.

Election is on May 19 and there will be three candidates for the two vacancies—Foster, Vernon Hurd and George Schuyler. Wilbur Way, whose term expires, will not be a candidate for reelection.

Foster today said that "I represent no person, group or organization. As a father of a child now in school and as a resident of Pacific Grove who realizes the importance of the school system to the future, I will, if elected, try to see that Pacific Grove leads the state with a modern, up-to-date school system."

Schuyler is the only incumbent seeking reelection. Hurd's candidacy was announced some time ago as was Judge Way's decision NOT to seek reelection.

There will be NO contests for positions on other Monterey Peninsula school boards.

Soldiers Rush To Obtain U.S. Citizenship

SALINAS—Nearly 200 soldiers of the Army of the United States, from local military posts, have become citizens in superior court ceremonies in Monterey county since October, 1943. Sgt. Arthur C. Gonzales of Fort Ord, in charge of applicants from the army ground replacement depot No. 2, estimated as a regular group of weekly applicants completed examinations and were admitted to citizenship yesterday by Superior Judge H. G. Jorgensen.

Requirements are three months in the armed services, a satisfactory service record, character references and passing grades in examination subjects. Men in service do not have to wait the customary year after filing applications.

Classed with Saboteurs

OPA Head Has Hard Words for Those Who Cheat on Rationing

WASHINGTON, April 20, (AP)—Congress was told by an OPA official today that with "hot" coupons bringing 50 cents each and illegal transactions draining off an estimated 2,500,000 gallons daily black market operations soon may force a reduction in civilian gasoline rations.

This assertion was made by Shad Polier, director of gasoline rationing enforcement for the office of price administration, in a digest of black market operations prepared for a house interstate subcommittee investigating the gasoline situation.

ALREADY DANGEROUS

"The black market in gasoline is already dangerous," Polier's memorandum said, "but if allowed to grow it will become a serious threat to the whole war effort."

The 2,500,000 gallons of gasoline which Polier said is the daily "tribute" to "the thieves and counterfeiters who steal, print and sell gasoline coupons and to the sellers who buy them or buy gas without coupons" would increase "A" rations by 30 miles a month or boost the top limit for "B" rations from the present ceilings of 325-475 miles to an estimated 700 miles monthly for business drivers.

CALLED SABOTAGE

"The saboteurs who print and sell counterfeit coupons, the car owners who buy coupons or buy gas without coupons, and the dealers who buy coupons to cover illegal sales of gasoline," his report said, "are no better than the saboteur who blows up a gasoline refinery."

The heaviest concentration of illegal coupons, was described in the report as being in the east, with the problem "also serious"

west and on the Gulf Coast. To support his contention that big time racketeers have gone into the counterfeit gasoline coupon business, Polier said in his memorandum that in February there was virtually no counterfeit money in circulation, "the counterfeiters of currency" having moved into "the more lucrative, easier-to-handle gasoline coupon racket."

OPA records of black market activities, he added, "are studded with names which for years have been linked with bootlegging, counterfeiting, white slavery, kidnapping and murder."

LIGHT SHOWERS "LAY THE DUST"

Showers of yesterday afternoon and last night brought enough moisture to "lay the dust" and to befit gardens and lawns, but did no major benefit to range feed or vital farm crops. The precipitation totaled .16 inches in Carmel Valley boosting the season total to 16.53 inches as compared with 12.73 inches last year. At San Clemente the rainfall totaled .15 inches.

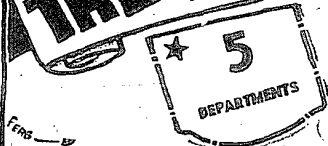

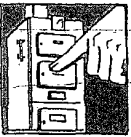
