Dear Tony:

We have decided to introduce, as part of our regular Trudeau School of Tuberculosis, a week's symposium on silicosis. Owing to the general interest in the subject and to its intimate association with tuberculosis, it is logical that we should do this.

It has been our custom in the past to invite distinguished specialists to address the regular sessions of the school on subjects related to tuberculosis. We would like to pursue the same policy in this special silicosis session. It would be necessary for us to hold these meetings during the week of June 18th to June 23rd. Would you be willing to sacrifice the time to come to Saranac Lake for this occasion? We would, of course, insure your traveling expenses but we are not in a position to offer any honorarium.

In order to avoid the possibility of our getting undesirable applicants for the school, we have very carefully selected those whom we accepted. In adding the subject of silicosis we shall have to be doubly cautious that we do not accept any fly-by-night silicosis specialists. I hope we can limit the number of those who attend this session to plant physicians who are of reputable standing in their communities.

I am enclosing a tentative schedule. I would like your criticism and suggestions. I sincerely trust that you will give it favorable consideration and that you may be able to participate with us in this endeavor.

Dear Mr. Genthalt:

I have not been able to identify the particular bill to which you refer in your letter of April 7. I enclose a copy of a proposed occupational disease act which is now before the Legislature. The number is Senate Bill 1632 and it was introduced by Senator O'Brien. My information is that if there is any bill passed, it will be this. Apparently everyone is agreed to it except that the Rochester industries would prefer that no legislation at all be enacted this year. They are working on a physiological test of disability in silicosis which they hope to perfect. How practical this is going to be I do not know.

It seems to me that this enclosed act is a pretty good one. You might be interested in writing to Mr. Manfred Bouditch, Secretary of the Special Industrial Disease Commission of the State Department of Labor, State House, Boston, and ask him to send you a copy of the recent report of his Commission. It is a very thorough piece of work.

We have not taken any action with respect to this sort of proposed legislation. Inasmuch as we do not write compensation insurance, this hardly comes within our scope.
