Arctic Flight By Graf To Be Pushed For '31

WASHINGTON, March 26 (AP)—
Plans for a 1931 polar cruise by
the Graf Zeppelin are being formed
by Aerocraft, the International so-
ciety for the exploration of arctic
regions by aircraft.
The expedition will be under-
taken for scientific investigations.
It was originally scheduled for
April and May of this year, but
abandoned when the Zeppelin Com-
pany could not obtain underwrit-
ers' insurance on ship and crew.
With all preparations made, in-
cluding the fitting of a landing
field at Fairbanks, Alaska, the
venture will be pushed on to com-
pletion, according to John A. Flem-
ing, acting vice president of the
American section of the society.

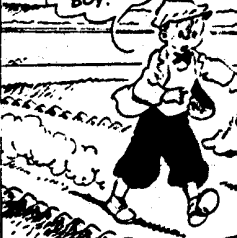
