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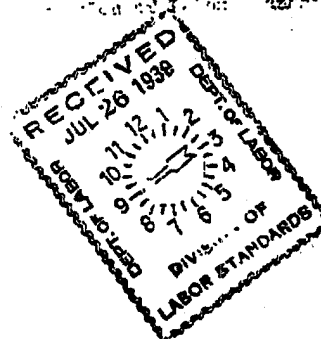

our President, Mr. G. A. Martin, to get an outsider's viewpoint
on our general safety program.

All of our processes, whether new or old, are safe-
guarded as to health and accident hazard to the best of our
knowledge; but Mr. Martin wanted the added satisfaction of
having a competent outside authority confirm our findings.

I regret that Dr. McCord's reports, which are type-
written and bound, are not in shape for distribution. Each
one is very voluminous and covers matters of process, formula-
tion, and general production detail that really should not
be made public.

If you have occasion to visit Cleveland at any time,
I shall be very pleased to discuss matters of paint industry
hazards. We are vitally interested in the protection of our
own men, and quite willing to help others to do the same.
