Said the court last evening: "There
are three things of superlative interest
to me wherever I go: The laborer, his
work, the things he produces. Em-
ployers I have never bothered my head
about. If their work is done properly
the public will
take care of them. In
time."

"All over the United States I have
been struck with the advantage the
followers of manual labor have as
compared with their brethren in Eu-
rope. In England we are won't to call
ourselves the most enlightened coun-
try in the world, as far as the relation
of labor and capital is concerned, but
I think the United States goes us one
better. Free schools, a general aboli-
tion of class distinctions and a demo-
cratic government have made the la-
borer here an equal of all men."

"I do not believe that things in the
East are just as favorable as they
might be, but I do think that generally
throughout the West the laborer should
have nothing to complain of. This I
attribute to the rapid development of
the western country, and to the need
of active, strong-bodied men beyond all
others. As far as I can see political
parties and the varied administrations
have but little to do with the every-
day existence of the American laborer."

"From what I have seen I believe
that California, and especially the
southern part of it, is destined one day
to become one of the greatest manufac-
turing centers of the world. It will be-
come so through rational processes,
and not through the hoarding of any
"technological" talent."

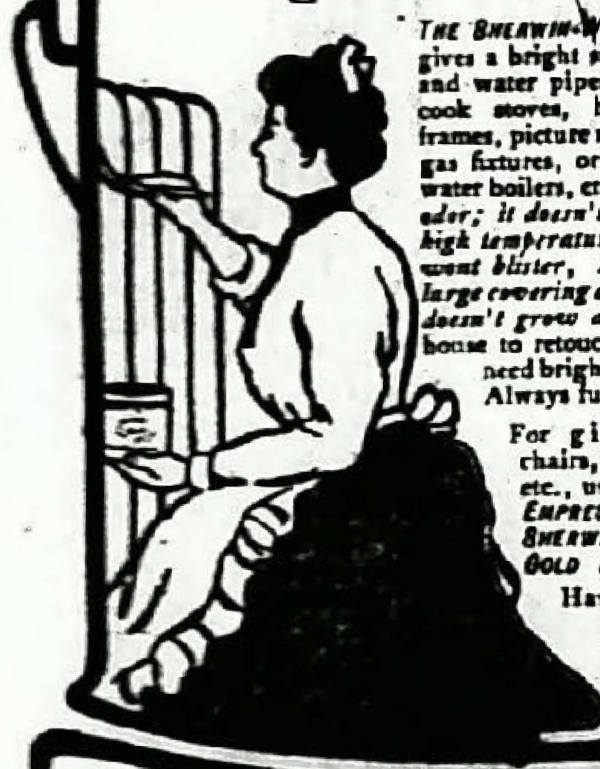
