**Wavell Campaigns
 Against Famine**
 CALCUTTA, Oct. 30 (U.P.)—Lord
 Wavell, new viceroy of India, an-
 nounced today after completing a
 three-day tour of famine areas
 that he will call upon the Indian
 army to aid destitute as part of a
 three-point relief program to
 halt the starvation death rate.
 The program includes:
 1. The government of the province
 of Bengal, which includes
 the most widespread famine areas,
 immediate action will begin to send
 Calcutta's destitute population to
 rest camps in suburban areas,
 where they will receive adequate
 food and medical attention.
 2. Gen. Claude Auchinleck,
 commander of British forces in In-
 dia, will furnish a supply expert
 who will expedite shipment of
 food to the famine areas.
 3. Auchinleck will make the re-
 sources of the Indian army avail-
 able for the movement of food,
 provisions and shelter and for the
 establishment of relief stores.
 In heating with green wood some
 20% of the heat is used to drive
 off the moisture, only the remain-
 der being available to heat the
 case.

as it was represented to be, the
 Red Cross could have paid the ex-
 pense without the slightest embar-
 rassment. It should have done so.
 Otherwise a few individuals who
 are able to pay their own way are
 invited to receive Red Cross cre-
 dentials and go touring.
 "On the contrary," the letter
 continues, "the syndicate which
 handles Mrs. Roosevelt's daily
 column has announced that the
 proceeds from her column during
 her absence would be contributed
 one-half to the Red Cross and
 one-half to the American Friends
 society."
 How much was that? The
 syndicate refuses to say. What
 has the American Friends so-
 ciety got to do with it, anyway?
 What is the matter with the
 Elks?
 "Mrs. Roosevelt did not inform
 us that she intended to make this
 contribution to the American Red
 Cross," is the next statement. I
 have tried to connect this one
 with the subject under discussion
 but it doesn't seem to fit. But I
 know that the idea didn't origi-
 nate in the syndicate, if that is
 what the Red Cross means to sug-
 gest. The syndicate merely com-
 plied with Mrs. Roosevelt's wishes.
 The same syndicate handles my
 copy, and I know Mr. Carlin, the
 manager, would never take it on
 himself to suggest that any of his
 trained seals should donate a
 week's or a month's royalties to
 this or that charity or cause. So
 that part seems to be mere stall-
 ing and filling and absolutely
 irrelevant.
 The next sentence says "Mrs.
 Roosevelt has been honorary
 chairman of the national com-
 mittee on volunteer service of the
 Red Cross for more than 10 years
 and has always taken a deep in-
 terest in Red Cross work, visit-
 ing many chapter workrooms and
 frequently offering her advice and
 commendation on Red Cross ac-
 tivities."
 There are several angles in
 that one. First, honorary means
 complimentary, or for free. Mrs.
 Roosevelt is honorary chairman
 by virtue of the election returns
 which are strictly political,
 whereas the Red Cross is sup-
 posed to be strictly non-politi-
 cal, and had better be again.
 "Has always taken a keen in-
 terest." Does everyone who
 has always taken a keen interest
 rate a personal army bomber,
 with necessary escorts and 40-
 some thousand gallons of gaso-
 line?
 "Visiting chapter rooms and fre-
 quently offering her advice and
 commendation." Was this then a
 reward for past visits to chapter
 rooms and advice and commen-
 dation? It was supposed to be a
 service mission. What actual
 service was performed?
 "She has also done personal ser-
 vice through knitting sweaters for
 servicemen and garments for re-
 lief through the Red Cross."
 That also is past performance
 and its mention further suggests
 that this trip was a personal re-

dence of politics in the Washing-
 ton headquarters. For the first
 time it has been exploited for po-
 litical and personal intentions,
 but the people won't take their
 resentment out of the Red Cross
 and those whom it exists to
 serve.
**SILVER STAR AWARDED
 MONTEREY MAN**
 Pfc. William J. Barnett of Mon-
 terey has been awarded a Silver
 Star for gallantry in action on New
 Guinea. It was announced today by
 the war department through the
 Associated Press. The citation car-
 ried no further information be-
 yond the action, which was near
 Soerabaja on January 5 of this year.

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
