January 15, 1936	- Blood Pressure 140/100
January 14, 1937	135/90
January 18, 1938	170/100
January 9, 1939	175/100
January 10, 1940	180/110
January 9, 1941	180/100

September 25th to October 13th, 1941 - Symptoms of hypertension became severe. Blood pressure markedly elevated. Headaches. Developed slight weakness on one side of face and left arm, which cleared up. The man was off work at this time. Had complete bed rest for two weeks, and was put on Haimased to bring down blood pressure.

October, 1941 - Diagnosis of duodenal ulcer was made at General Hospital (probably an in-patient at this time). (This is not so, see our xray reports - CDA).

October 5th, 1942 - Numbness of left side of face with some weakness and distortion. Blood pressure 230/110. Impression: Localized cerebral edema.

October 9th, 1942 - Blood pressure 200/130. Buzzy and headaches. After symptoms improved this man returned to work - the duties assigned were light - supervising more or less.

January 9 - 19th, 1943 - Symptoms again prominent. Headaches and dizziness with marked elevation of blood pressure. About the 18th he became uncontrollable and had to be admitted to the General Hospital.

This man was a free imbibor, was employed for years at the Eagle Picher Lead Co. handling metallic lead (not the salts of lead). His lead exposure at a minimum, as he was operating the presses. His picture while under my observation was one of progressive cardio-renal disease complicated with hypertensive heart disease.

8/26/43 - This information was forwarded by the family physician - Doctor Anthony Matuska.

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
