Labor Commission Collects \$100,000

SACRAMENTO, May 16 (UP) — Unpaid wages totaling more than \$100,000 were collected for California workers by the state labor commission during the month of March.

This was reported to Governor Rolph by Will J. French, director of industrial relations, who said the total collected during the same month in 1930 was \$85,887.

The state settled 1336 wage claims during the month, the average claim being \$65.51.

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
