continued the guerrilla raids which have cost the Japanese so heavily in recent months. Japanese garrisons on a dozen fronts were raided, disrupting communication and supply lines.

Many towns and villages the Japanese previously had won by bloody sacrifice of manpower were retaken by the Chinese. A 20-mile stretch of the Grand Canal between Hangchow and Tientsin, scene of the first major defeat of a modern Japanese army, was recaptured.

Senator Protests WPA Relief Waste

WASHINGTON, April 19 (AP)—Senator Berry (Dem., Tenn.) said today he had protested to President Roosevelt against "waste in WPA relief."

The Tennessee senator said he had discussed with the president this morning the latter's recovery-relief message to congress and told Mr. Roosevelt "that wastes should be deleted from the WPA program."

"I told him there was a great deal of merit in the entire program," Berry said, "but that I was not going to vote blindly for relief unless wastes were eliminated."

"Relief money has been spent for political purposes," Berry added. "We have not remedied this situation although we have had several years experience."

Union Seeks Damages

SAN FRANCISCO, April 19 (AP)—An injunction and damage suit against 1,095 defendants in Nevada county was filed in federal court today by the International Union of Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers.

The court action resulted from the recent "purge" in which CIO miners contended they were driven out of Nevada City by vigilantes. The miners and their families established what they termed a "refugee" camp in Sacramento.

The suit, asking \$10,000 damages from each defendant, names Sheriff Carl Tobiasen; John Woods, Undersheriff; John Thomas, Grass Valley mayor; Ben Hall, Nevada City mayor; Ben Jenkins, Grass Valley police chief; V. C. Robson, Nevada City police chief, and 1,890 John Does.

The action, filed by Attorney A. Scott Erwin, seeks an injunction, for various purposes, including:

To keep people in Nevada City from interfering with the constitutional rights of residents, to restrain interference with peaceful assembly, to restrain intimidation and coercion on union men to prohibit unlawful search, and to enjoin interference with union activities in the county.
