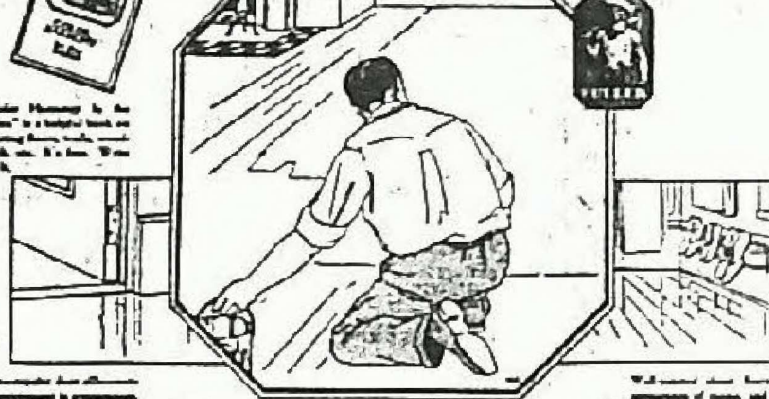

Many Canadians Emigrating to United States

(EXCLUSIVE REPORT)
VANCOUVER (R. C.) Sept. 11. Nearly 4000 Canadians left this country for the United States in the period from June 10, 1914 to August 11, 1915, according to statistics prepared by the United States Consulate here. Of this number more than 1700 were Canadian born or naturalized citizens and another 2300 were British born.
There are thirty-two other American consular offices in Canada to be heard from as there are only the figure of the port alone. Canadians do not come under the quota, but they are in the consular for years. British-born quotas are filled for the next two years, and Canadians who apply now are given a visa entitling them to immigration two years hence.
