Dairying Decreases In Salt River Valley

Pima Cotton Growers Plan to Exit

PHOENIX (APRIL) Sept. 19.—The Jennison Construction and Engineering Company of El Paso is completing a ten-mile open drainage canal, twenty feet in depth and sixteen feet wide, in the Laveen farming district, about ten miles southwest of Phoenix, and south of the Salt River channel. A large amount of water has been developed, and is to be used for irrigation further westward. Funds for the work were provided by formation of a 3000-acre district, which bonded itself for \$100,000. A similar canal operates south of Tempe, its water irrigating farms on the Pima reservation, north of the Gila River.

DAIRYING ON DECLINE

An odd situation has developed in Salt River Valley dairying. Butter fat is down to about 31 cents, delivered at the creameries, subject to grading and deductions. This is declared so low that no profit can be made by the producer, so cows have been sold and the industry is on the decline. In the valley at present there are only about 12,000 cows, compared with 18,000 before the war.

EXTEND OPERATIONS (RECEIVE DISPATCH)

YUMA (APRIL) Sept. 11.—Operations of the Yuma Cotton Growers' Association, heretofore confined to the Salt River Valley, have been extended to cover a large percentage of the cotton acreage of the Yuma Valley, after the plan had been endorsed by the Yuma Clearinghouse Association. The Association has arranged for advancing \$275,000 to Yuma cotton growers for picking and ginning costs. Considerable damage has been done by bugs during the last two months, and hardly a fourth of a crop will be harvested in the bottom neighborhoods and the lower valley.

ZION CITY (ILL.) Sept. 19.—The line forces of the army of moving through the rain a camouflage of dense closed in today on the fortified position of the Rev. Thomas H. Nelson, commander of the independent forces fighting the followers of Dowle.

The newest move of the Zion forces came following the decision of Judge Claire C. Edwards in the Circuit Court at Waukegan, a sort of Hague tribunal which has more or less success in diverting, but not halting the Zion warriors. Judge Edwards dissolved the injunction which the independents had procured restraining Voliva from disconnecting the old sewer.

No sooner had dissolution set in than the whiskered followers of Voliva with a low, glad cry, raised their trenching tools and advanced.

"They can't whip us," declared Gen. Nelson. "The new sewer they are putting in is private. They will not permit us to connect it. But we won't quit. They don't dare come any closer. I've thrown them off my porch before."

Gen. Nelson went out to apostrophize the enemy again. The enemy, chuckling, waved its taunting whippers over the edge of the trench.

MOVEMENT FOR INDEPEND- ENCE OF MEMEL HEADED BY DR. KRAUS
