CARLSON-FORD LIMITED - PAPER ON INGESTION OF ASBESTOS

Carlson-Ford Limited of the U.K. are interested in Fybex® for beverage filters and apparently feel that the hazards from ingesting, as distinct from inhaling asbestos and other short fibers, may have been over-estimated. In previous correspondence, Mr. R. Shackleton, Managing Director, referred to an article published by the Medical Research Council of the United Kingdom allegedly showing no signs of cancer in feeding studies with asbestos. I'm going to discuss the Fybex® business and possibilities of licensing it with Mr. Shackleton in New York on June 18.

In response to my request, Mr. Shackleton sent me a copy of paper referred to. Among the authors is our old friend and devil's advocate, Dr. Paul Gross. May I have your comments on it before the June 18 meeting?

I'd also appreciate the following information on asbestos to aid in answering questions that may arise in the discussion.

- 1) Is it true that there is no statistical difference in incidence of lung cancer between nonsmoking asbestos workers and the rest of the population?
- 2) Can you give me a rough ratio of the incidence of lung cancer of the smoking asbestos worker compared to the smoking nonworker?
- 3) Can you give me a rough ratio of the incidence of gastro-intestinal cancer of the asbestos worker compared to the rest of the population? Is there any sign of secondary causal affect here, as in the case of smoking with lung cancer?

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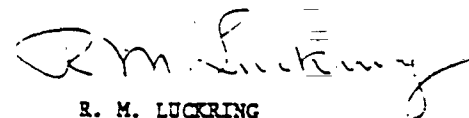
