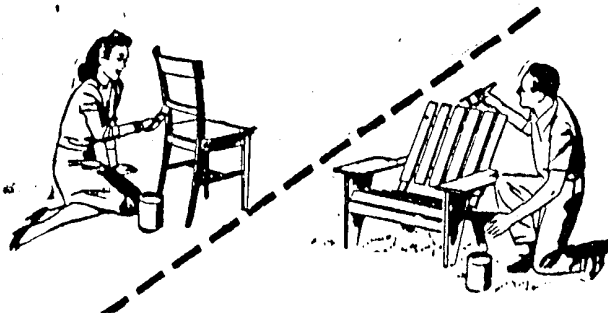


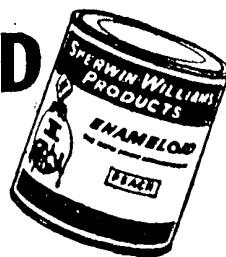

Another overseas assault on American price levels and our home market is ready to roll. And this time it may work.

Tariff-slicing pacts between this country and 32 others, who among themselves do 80 per cent of the world's trade, are due to be signed Monday. American duties on a few hundred commodities and manufactured products will come tumbling.

Prices on imported products you buy or would like to buy may drop. For example, we levy a tariff of up to either 37½ cents a pound or 25 per cent of value on imported woolen fabrics. This tariff may be cut. If it is, the duty slash plus the cheapening of the British money should make their woolen fabrics cost less in the United States. American woolen mills doubtless won't like that.

We levy tariffs for a number of reasons: To get money for our treasury, but more frequently to keep foreign producers from undersealing our own manufacturers and driving them out of business. Sometimes we have put the tariff so high that other countries cannot sell here at all. However, since 1934 we have cut our tariff wall, on the average, in half. But some items are still taxed high.

For example, the French contend they have 200 products for sale on which we have tariffs of 40 per cent or more. They cite one, cigaret lighters, against which we place an import tax ranging up to 110 per cent of the original value. Naturally, when that tariff is paid, the price of the French lighter in our stores is very high.

Six months ago American officials and those of 32 other countries sat down in the French-Alps town of Annecy and began to bargain. We said we'd cut some tariffs on their goods if they cut some on ours. The trade agreements that grew out of these months of horse-trading were held up until President Truman could get his recip-

The pacts to be signed Monday will be hailed by some as one step toward freeing the world's trade lanes of the roadblocks of quotas, restrictions and high duties that have been piled up since before the war. You will be reminded that if the United States can help others sell goods here to pay for the things they get from us, we may be able to get them off the American taxpayers' neck.

But there will doubtless be complaints, too, from American manufacturers who fear the pinch of foreign competition and from high tariff advocates in congress.

On what specific goods duties are to be cut this time will not be known until the pacts are released in Washington. But in foreign trade circles here the guessing is that the cuts will average 25 per cent, and that on some items the tariff slashes will go below the "peril points" which congress removed just two weeks ago under administration pressure.

Dairy products, fruits and furs are mentioned as likely to be cut lower than the president would have been permitted to, had the peril point provision of last year's reciprocal trade agreement law been retained. This required that congress must approve any tariff cuts low enough to "imperil" the domestic market for American goods. Pacts about to be announced do not have to be approved by congress.

Other items believed to be due for tariff cuts are textiles, wood products, leather goods, hardware, table utensils, and a variety of food and beverage products, such as cordials, rum, molasses, jellies and jams.

In return for these concessions by the United States, other countries are supposed to cut their duties against some of our industrial machinery, chemicals, office supplies, trucks, and farming implements.
