A 17-Year Old Record

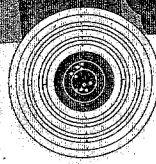
Shooting  Ammunition

When Walter Stocklin of Chicago stepped up during the "Any Revolver" re-entry matches at Camp Perry and announced that he was a candidate, no one suspected that a seventeen-year-old record was about to be shattered.

Particularly not when, with all the regular fifty-yard ranges in use, Mr. Stocklin chose to shoot on the Fifty Meter (164.04 feet) International Range. Yet, in spite of Mr. Stocklin's handicap of 14.04 feet, two of Mr. Stocklin's targets, a 97- and a 99, were five points better than the twenty-shot record made by A. P. Lane in 1913.

And so, while in a previous issue of U.S.R.A. Bulletin we announced Mr. Stocklin's achievement as another victory in which U. S. Ammunition played a part, we announce it now as a world's record.

The ammunition used by Mr. Stocklin in this shoot was U. S. .38 Special Mid-Range Sharp Shoulder Cartridges. In commenting upon the performance of U. S. Ammunition, Mr. Stocklin said, "Another happy discovery was that this particular gun, holding at 6 o'clock, shot the mid-range load and the full charge cartridges without any change in sighting for pinwheel, etc. It astonished me very much to see your mid-range load hold up at this great distance."
