MacDonald Calls Cabinet Meeting for Today, Which May End First Labor Government.

BALDWIN WILL BE PREMIER

Conservative Victory Is Unprecedented With Labor Reduced and Liberals Nearly Wiped Out.

NOTABLE LEADERS FALLEN

Asquith's Lieutenants Go Down and Four Labor Under Secretaries—Four Women Win.

London, Oct. 26.—The Conservative party will have a clear majority of about 200 seats over all other parties in the new Parliament as a result of the remarkable turnover in yesterday's elections.

The present standing of the parties in the House of Commons is as follows: Conservatives, 403; Labor, 170; Liberals, 20; Constitutionalists, 10.

President MacDonald arrived at Downing Street this evening and called a special meeting of the Cabinet for tomorrow morning. In view of the heavy defeat suffered by the Labor Government, the polls in London and at the House of Commons may decide the fate of the Government.
