It is with a deep sense of loss that we report the sudden death on Saturday, May 31, 1952, of our beloved Vice President and General Manager, Mr. Michel J. Fortier. His death occurred while he was playing golf at Pepper Pike, Cleveland.

We have lost a wonderful friend and leader. Mr. Fortier's career with the Company was an outstanding example of making good on every job and in every position he held. He applied his full energies and ability to everything he did and served in each capacity in such a way that he was ready and prepared for the job ahead. He served with distinction in every post he held, in addition to finding time for many outside interests and many contributions to the paint industry as a whole.

"Mike", as he was affectionately known to his host of friends and associates, was "true blue". He was a leader and had the ability to inspire others to improve themselves and to do a better job. He was never too busy with all of his responsibilities to see anyone and he gave generously of his time and advice to all who sought it. No detail was too small, no problem too large. He had infinite capacity for work and accomplishment and put the same energy and enthusiasm into everything he did—whether business or a game of golf. He liked to see things "first hand" out in the field and to call on customers and branches and talk to our sales representatives. Often the information thus gathered formed the basis of important decisions when he returned home, perhaps a new product, a change in plans, or an idea to pass along to others.

"Mike" Fortier believed that people were the key factors in successful operations and that the way to solve problems and situations was to put the right man into them, then help that man make good. He was an excellent selector and developer of men and many of our present successful managers and executives were of his selection. He was keenly interested in young men.

Only a few days before his death he concerned himself about a young lad whom he wanted to help get a good education.

And so we say goodbye to a great friend and co-worker, the imprint of whose deeds and memory will long remain.

Mr. Fortier had completed 24 years of service with the Sherwin-Williams organization.

Mr. Fortier joined the John Lucas Company, a Sherwin-Williams subsidiary, in 1928. Three years later he was named a sales representative in New Orleans for the parent company.

In 1935 he became Division Manager in New Orleans and in 1940 he was made District Manager of the old Mississippi Valley District. In 1945 he was advanced to the position of District Manager of North Central District at Cleveland.

A year later he was named Vice President and General Manager of the Acme White Lead & Color Works of Detroit, a large Sherwin-Williams subsidiary.

In 1944 Mr. Fortier was called back to Cleveland headquarters, and elected Vice President and Executive Assistant to the President. That year he was also named to the Board of Directors of the Company. In December 1945 he was appointed Vice President and General Manager of the Sherwin-Williams Co., the position he held at his death.

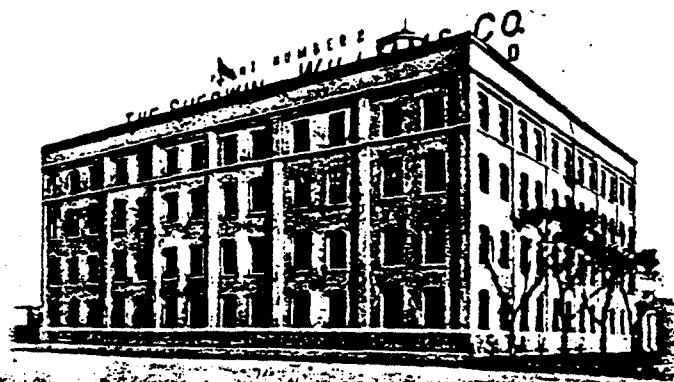

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In 1899, the old Calumet factory equipment was removed and replaced with twelve 30-inch standard S-W liquid paint mills, mixers, and thinning tanks. The chief products were SWP, floor enamel, and roof paints.



In 1903, office and warehouse buildings, now No. 13 and No. 15, were built. The Chicago Sales office and warehouse were consolidated with the factory at Kensington. The Western Region office has since been moved to the city at 300 W. Lake Street.

Growth of the Chicago Plant

The Chicago plant of S-W has shown an enormous development from the original Calumet Paint factory. In 1888, the Sherwin-Williams Company bought this small plant which had been used for manufacturing railroad paint by the Pullman Car Company.

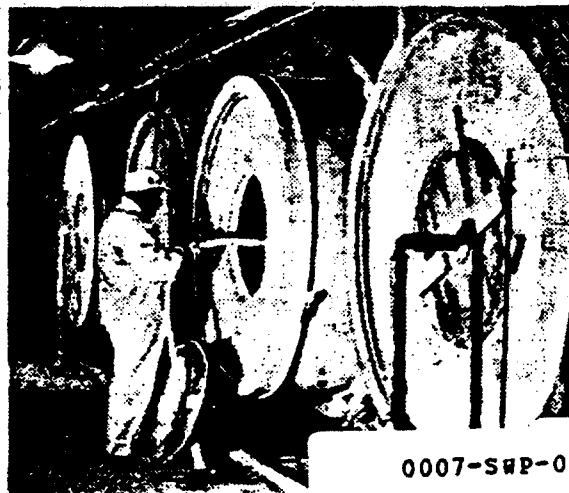
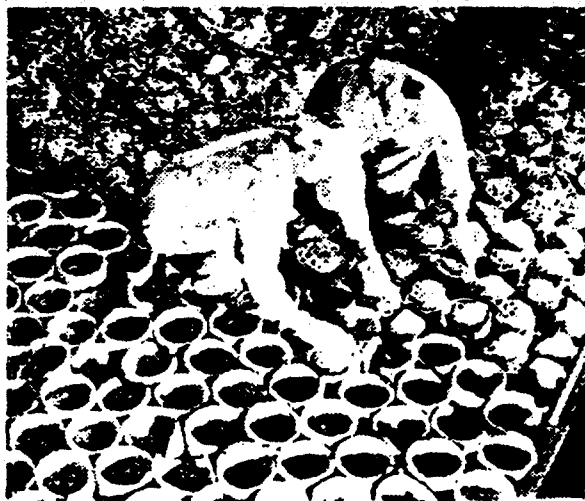
At that time the equipment included 1 stone mill, 12 small

iron mills for coach colors, a slag crusher, a pulverizer, and 2 stone mills for making freight car paints. Today we know that original building as No. 18. Mr. George A. Martin was employed in 1890 as plant superintendent and the factory staff was composed of twelve men, who later rose to the presidency of the company.

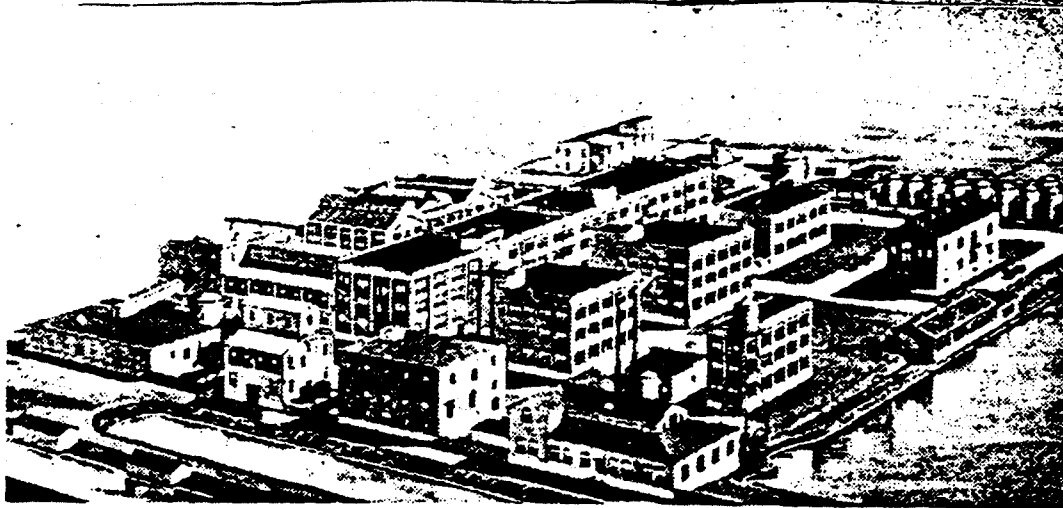
In 1903, the Dry Color and Insecticide Departments were installed in buildings No. 110-114. This consolidated the manufacture of these products in Chicago. There have been many

additions to the Dry Color Department, including the manufacture of dispersed colors in 1929. In 1937, insecticide manufacture was transferred to Bound Brook.

A White Lead Department using the Dutch process was established in 1910. A quick process plant corroding lead in cylinders was added in 1921. The old Dutch process was discontinued in 1943. In 1947 the manufacture of white lead was discontinued because of the decline in white lead as a paint pigment.

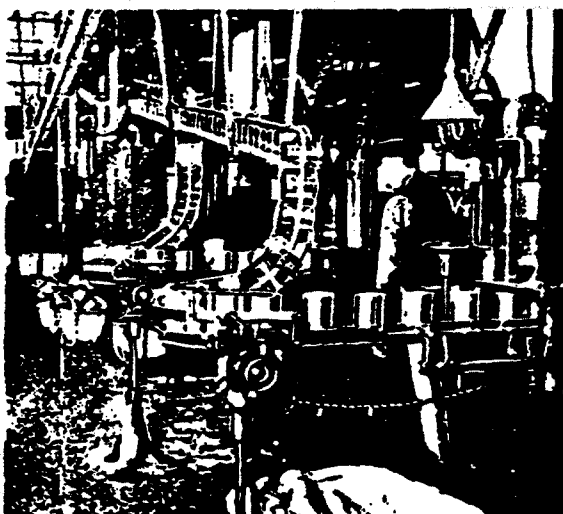


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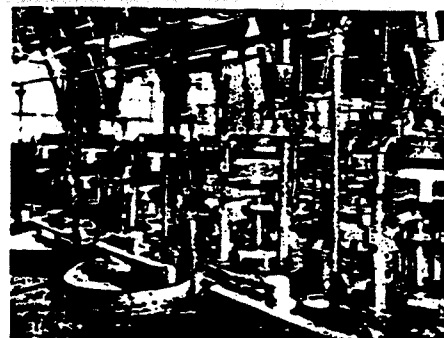


At the beginning of war with Germany in 1914, it was no longer possible to procure intermediates for dry color manufacture from Germany. S-W decided to manufacture such products in their own factories. The first product was beta naphthol. The Dry Color Department began this work but due to the increased demand, a new Chemical Products Department was established. Dr. Ney, who had past experience in manufacturing intermediates in Germany, was engaged along with several other chemists. The chief products were

beta naphthol, paranitranalin and M.N.P.T. Because it was impossible to procure any of these items from Germany, every effort was made for maximum production. Speed was the key note. As the manufacture of M.N.P.T. started, one of the first batches exploded and destroyed the building. However, in a comparatively short time, the processes were simplified and the Chemical Products plant began to operate smoothly. Dr. Van Stone and Wyatt Miller, now General Superintendent, were the pioneers in developing this paint.



The Tin Can Department was transferred from Cleveland to Chicago in 1920. The annual capacity has increased many times since that date. During World War II, fiber cans were produced to save metal.

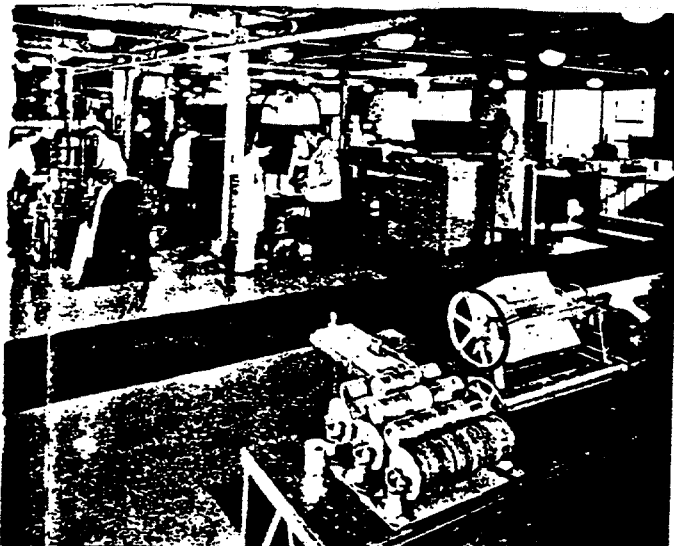


Building No. 23 was erected in 1921 to provide additional equipment for the manufacture of high quality enamels and other liquid paints. The equipment included 15 tandem mills, 4 roller mills, 38 mixers, and 38 thinning tanks. The daily capacity was 4,000 gallons.

About 1920, there was a heavy demand for quick-drying finishes for automobiles. The oleoresinous type of finish then used was too slow for the production of automobiles. Nitrocellulose lacquers were developed and finishing time was reduced to a few hours. S-W began lacquer manufacture in buildings No. 510-544 in 1922. At that time Dr. Van Stone was in charge and Fred Lang, now superintendent, and Carl Dodert were then employed.

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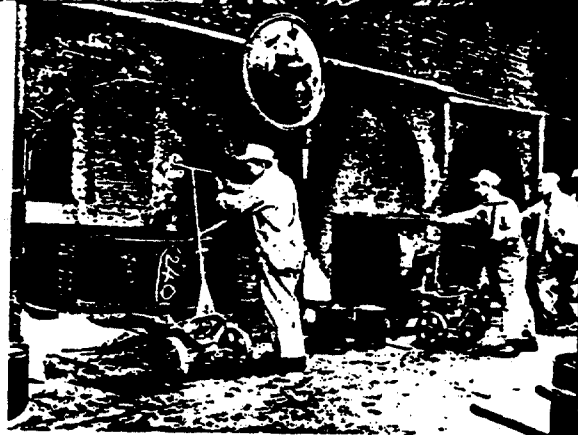




The Allied Research Laboratory was established in 1935 on the top floor of building No. 531 for research and development of paint, enamel, and vehicle formulas for Sherwin-Williams and their affiliated companies.

Left, below, the old open kettle method for making oleo resinous varnishes.

Below, with the decrease in the demand for the old natural-resin varnishes, a synthetic resin varnish plant was installed for the manufacture of alkyd, phenolic, and similar varnishes in 1938.



In 1947 when the White Lead Department was closed, "E" Paint Department was established in Building 200. 24 tanks were installed in November, 1947. Right shows the latest addition completed in 1951 which was the installation of 30 new tanks.

In 1941 the new Chemical Products building was constructed to produce many items required for military use. This included many special chemicals for explosives, sulfa, drugs, and other products.



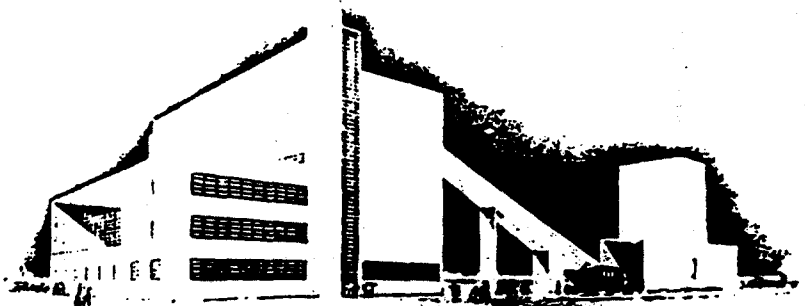
S-W became a leader in the development of water emulsion paints. In 1941, complete equipment was installed for the manufacture of Kem-Tone in building No. 18. Additional equipment for making Super Kem-Tone was added in this building in 1949.



Exterior and interior views of the new warehouse which was erected in 1941, with a floor space of 215,000 square feet or 5 acres, with the latest in modern equipment. It provides space for stock of the wide variety of products sold by S.W.

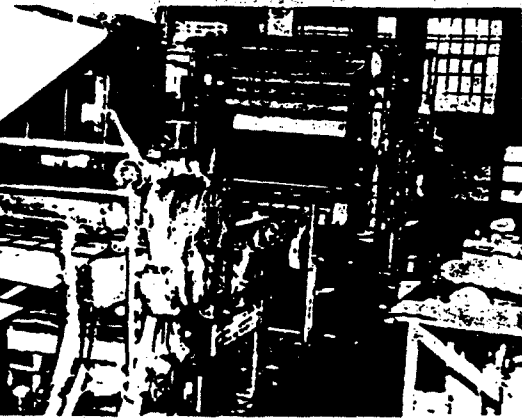


In 1946, the new power plant was built to provide steam and compressed air for the Kensington plant. This plant is equipped with the most modern boilers, air compressors, auxiliary machinery, coal and ash-handling devices.



The old Power Plant building No. 90 is now devoted to modern varnish storage tanks.

In 1947 the Lithograph Department became a part of the Container Division.

SUMMER HEAT

The summer heat, although not strictly an occupational hazard, frequently contributes to considerable pain, discomfort and complications on the job. The extreme temperatures can produce heat exhaustion and make one more susceptible to the possibilities of dermatitis.

The victim of heat exhaustion gets listless, dazed and loses some of his alertness and efficiency. This condition is an invitation for an accident. If you become dizzy, stomach-sick, or chilly, **REPORT TO THE MEDICAL DEPARTMENT AT ONCE!**

Although there is little we can do to prevent the heat of the summer weather, we can take precautions to avoid the consequences. To stave off heat exhaustion, a sensible diet should be followed. Go easy on the heavy foods and alcoholic beverages, and if you perspire a lot, occasional salt tablets should be taken with plenty of cool water.

Dermatitis can be prevented by following several simple rules. Frequent washing of the exposed parts of the body and a daily shower are of the utmost importance. Work clothes should be changed frequently to eliminate contact with irritating materials.



Tank Cleaning Safety

Entry into tanks, tubs and vessels requires precautions to insure the safety of the employees involved.

Life Saver

Recently the Medical Department obtained an instrument which automatically performs artificial respiration. This instrument, which is known as a "Pneolator", produces respiration in a non-breathing patient with a gentle pre-determined pressure on inhalation, and without suction on exhalation.

The Pneolator is contained in a compact case and can be readily transported to any location where it is needed. To provide full protection for the plant and our employees the Fire Brigade, Fire Patrolmen and Plant Guards have all been trained to operate the Pneolator.
