Dear Doctor Kehoe:

The problem of lead analyses in patients suspected of having lead poisoning has been coming up for discussion again in our medical service, and I wonder whether you might be in a position to permit us to take advantage of your kind offer (February 24, 1943). If so, I would appreciate receiving one or two of the blood collecting assemblies to keep on hand when such patients are admitted. We receive a few patients suspected of having lead poisoning each year and it happens that one such patient is in the ward at the present time. If it would be helpful to you and you will send me the instructions, I would be glad to assemble the necessary equipment. If I remember correctly, you use a special type of needle which contains no solder.
