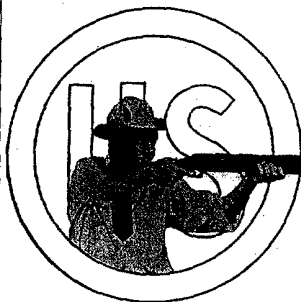




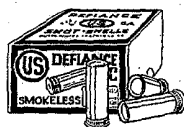
A Combination that's Hard to Beat

In 1925 Arey, shooting Climax shells, blasted his way to the top not only in the Single Target Championship and the Double Target Championship of his state, but in the All-Around Championship as well. At 16 yards he shattered 1045 x 1100—an average of 95%. In the doubles he broke 215 x 250. And in the handicap he scored 532 x 600.

Moreover, not satisfied with confining his wins to his own state, Arey packed his gun and a supply of Climax trap-loads to Atlanta, Georgia. There, with a score of 198 x 200 and a straight run of 181, he carried away the second highest honors in Class A at the Southern Indian Shoot.
