

until the laws are amended.

In Wilmington where 260 violators were summoned to court today, Judge Henry R. Isaacs ordered a rescheduling of cases, spreading them over a four-day period beginning Wednesday.

A bill to repeal the ancient laws has been passed by the senate, but was defeated in the house. This maintains Morford amounts to a "mandate for 100 percent enforcement."

Officials of several cities ordered no arrests.

Mayor J. Wallace Woodford of Dover described the action as "a lot of non-sense."

"About the only thing we can do," said Mayor Edward C. Evans of Milford, "is to put up gates at the entrance to town on Saturday midnight."

Under the law, violators are liable to fines of \$1 or \$8 depending on the nature of the offense. If the fine is not paid, the alternate is a jail sentence of 21 hours.

RIGGER MAINS PROVIDED.

The project calls for enlargement of the city's storm, sanitary, and industrial sewer system to 21- and 33-inch mains. The main line will be laid on Borregas avenue for three miles to the outfall.

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Trustees Order Work Continued On 'Bent' Well

SANTA CLARA, March 5.—Continued development of Santa Clara's ill-starred well was voted at a meeting of city trustees here tonight.

When drilling on the well reached 229 feet, a clay stratum slid sideways, more than 100 feet below the surface, bending the casing almost three feet out of line. Believed to be a total loss, investigation shows that the well can be tapped at the present level with the probability that the water will be clear, said City Engineer Edgar C. Schott.
