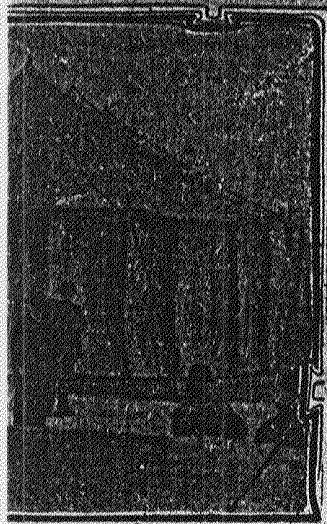

NO MORE FOOD FOR LOAFERS

The Rule That "He Who Will Not Work Shall Not Eat" is to Be Enforced.

Naturally, there are those who take advantage of such a situation as confronts San Francisco at this time. There is a certain percentage of men, who never have worked, and have no thought of ever working, and who are enjoying life to the uttermost under existing conditions. Steps will be taken at once to persuade men of this type that San Francisco is no place for such as they, and if they will not work after opportunity is offered, they will be driven from the city or jailed as vagrants.

It was found necessary some days ago to limit the serving of hot meals to women and children, at the Golden Gate Park relief stations, for it had become the custom for scores and hundreds of men, after gorging themselves to repletion at the breakfast hour, to stretch themselves out on the grass in front of the kitchens and calmly await the serving of dinner. They crowded women, and children out of the lines, and it was necessary to deal leniently with them.

It was estimated yesterday that there were about 30,000 people in Golden Gate Park, several thousand of them being men. Many of the latter were busily at work erecting shelters for their own families or doing all in their power to aid others. Many, also, jumped gladly forward when announcement was made that there was work to be had in the downtown districts, and these men trooped forth to work, that they might earn money with which to provide for themselves and their loved ones and no longer be dependent upon charity.

But hundreds, even thousands, refused to stir, announcing in tones of entire satisfaction that existing conditions were good enough for them and refusing to work. These fellows will be given short shrift, and if they persist in their refusal to work will be driven out like pariahs to shift for themselves. In future, Captain John Smith's rule that, "He who will not work shall not eat," will be in force, and the money of those who have given so liberally to the aid of San Francisco in her day of need will not be used to provide for the slothful.

LACK OF TEAMS TO HAUL DEBRIS

Lack of teams to haul away the debris is retarding the work of cleaning the northside ruined district to some extent, but good progress is being made, notwithstanding the handicap.

Several hundred laborers added their names to the pay-rolls yesterday, and excavating is progressing so rapidly that the teams now at work are hardly able to carry off the debris being thrown into the streets. Two hundred additional wagons can easily be used.

Most of the work is now being done between Montgomery street and the ferries. The cross streets from Leavenworth east to Montgomery are cleared for traffic, their entire length, and both sides of Market street are in remarkably good condition, all things
