Beccali After Cunningham Race

MILAN, Italy, May 18 (AP)—Just Beccali, Italy's Olympic 1500-meter champion, today said he was ready to go to the United States for a race against Glenn Cunningham and Bill Bonthron, America's two great mile runners, if he could get a furlough from his municipal job here.

Beccali has been invited to run in an invitation meet at Princeton June 18 in a mile run to which Bonthron, Cunningham, Gene Tenake and Jack Lovelock, Oxford student, have been invited. Beccali, who has never run the mile distance so far as known here, holds the world record of 49 for 1500 metres, the "Olympic mile." He defeated Lovelock last summer a short time after the Oxford runner had set a new world mark of 4:07.4 for the mile.

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15 Mermen Expected To Eclipse Record In Card Meet Tonight

Every one of the 15 entries in the Senior Pacific Association's 440-yard freestyle championship race tonight in the Stanford pool should better the meet record set in 1923 by Lester "Buster" Smith of the Olympic Club. Norton Thornton, Stanford coach, under whose direction the meet is being held, will be surprised if the record of 6 minutes, 8 seconds is not surpassed by each contestant. Smith's record has been on the books for 12 years simply because this is the first year since 1923 that the event has been held outdoors.

The fact that every one of the 15 mermen has bettered the record in practice is an indication of the class the race holds. "Buster" Oids, of Palo Alto, who will be competing for the Olympic Club tonight is favored to win the event. "Buster" has been timed in 4:54.2 for the distance. Art Lindgren, San Francisco Y. M. C. A. star, is the chief threat to Oids. Lindgren won over the local boy recently over the 220-yard freestyle distance but Oids is believed the stronger performer over the longer route.

Bob Foster, captain-elect of the Stanford varsity team, is expected to set a new American record in the 440-yard breaststroke race with his principal competition coming from Warren Smith of the Lake-side Swimming Club and Capt.

Bob Clark of Stanford. The record of 5:16.6 is held by John Paulsen of U. S. C.

Diving Exhibition The meet gets under way promptly at 8 o'clock. In addition to heats and finals in the two races, exhibition diving will be given by Milton Friedman, Tom Booth and Maurice Berger of the Stanford team. A 50-yard race for Stanford squad members also will be held. General admission to the races is 40 cents and 25 cents to students.

U. S. Golfers Hope To Shake British Jinx

PRESTWICK, Scotland, May 18 (AP)—By force of numbers as well as by individual skill, America's simon-pures hope to shake jinx that trails invading players in the British amateur golf championship here next week.

Although only two native Americans, Jess Sweetser and Bobby Jones, ever have won the title, the current United States challenge, consisting as it does of all nine members of the victorious Walker Cup team, as well as Jesse Guillard, one-time Boston "sage gun," is by no means taken lightly by British critics.

Little Has Chance Bookmakers, in fact, have installed Johnny Goodman, American open champion, as co-favorite with the Scot, Jack McLean, for the title won so unexpectedly a year ago by Kenneth Michael Scott. Not far behind him in the list of odds are the other eight Walker Cup stars—George Dunlop, who was eliminated by Scott in the semi-finals last year at St. Andrews; Gus Moreland, Jack Westland, Francis Oulmet, Max Marston, Chandler Egan, Johnny Fischer and Lawson Little.

So far only Marston and Egan, of the Americans, have arrived on the scene to test their shots over the 6,331-yard championship layout. These two veterans tramped around the course yesterday and returned identical cards of 77, four over par. All the other invaders were due in today or tomorrow.

Draw Is Obstacle The biggest obstacle in the path to an American victory lies in the draw. Every Walker Cup player except Goodman is in one half of the draw. Oulmet and Moreland will meet in the first round and the survivor will clash with Fischer, assuming the Cincinnati youngster gets by his initial opponent, Graham Patrick Stirling. Thus the American contingent will lose at least two of its number before the third round is reached.

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PALO ALTO PREPS MAY SET MARKS

Teams from nine schools in the North Coast Section of the California Intercollegiate Federation will vie for the annual N. C. S. swimming championships tomorrow in Marina pool, Marina.

Four schools in the Peninsula Athletic League will be represented — Palo Alto, Sequoia, Burlingame and San Jose; three from the East Bay Athletic League — Berkeley, Alameda and John Swett of Crocker-Hart and Tamalpais and Santa Rosa from the North Bay League.

Team titles in the "A" and "B" divisions will be decided with Sequoia and Berkeley teams expected to put up the stiffest fight for the championship. Coach Bob Fraser's Palo Alto team will be the "dark horse" of the meet.

In the last seven years that the meet has been held the Vikings have triumphed four times and have finished second in three of the meets. Palo Alto won the 130-pound title last year and finished second in the unlimited class which was won by Berkeley.

Lloyd Wilson, Viking breaststroke swimmer, is expected to set a new record in the 100-yard breaststroke race for Class "B." Wilson negotiated the distance four seconds faster than the meet record of 1:21.6 this year and should have little trouble repeating his performance Saturday. The local prep men should also crack the record in the four-man "B" 100-yard relay. Jack Wilson, Ed Beaton, Ted Holmes and Bill McKaig were timed in 49 seconds flat this season. The record made last year by Wilson, Beaton, McKaig and Grinnell is :50.6.

The meet will start at 10:30 o'clock in the morning with trial events. Finals will be held in the afternoon at 3 o'clock. No women will be admitted to the morning races. Admission is 15 cents to students and 25 cents to outsiders.

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
