Demo Chiefs Will Meet on Strategy

Johnson-Humphrey lead-
ers from Northern Cal-
ifornia will meet with
Governor Edmund Brown
and Democratic State
Chairman Roger Kent in
Sacramento tonight to
plan campaign strategy.

More than 100 persons
have been invited to the
executive mansion for the ses-
sion.

There will be a discussion
of plans for the visits of
President Johnson and his
running-mate, Senator Hu-
bert H. Humphrey, to North-
ern California. Each is to
make at least two trips here,
Kent announced.

BLUE PRINT

The Governor, Kent, Thom-
mas H. Saunders, Northern
California manager for the
Democrats, and Assembly-
man Nicholas C. Petris of
Oakland, co-chairman with
Kent of the Northern Califor-
nia campaign, will "blue
print campaign plans," Kent
said.

Lloyd Hand, a former Tex-
an, was named finance direc-
tor of the California presi-
dential campaign. The selec-
tion was made by Brown, the
Johnson Statewide chairman.
Hand is a Los Angeles insur-
ance executive and once
served as an assistant to Mr.
Johnson while he was Senate
majority leader and later
Vice President.

ORGANIZATION

The Johnson campaign
committee announced that it
is rapidly completing its
county and local organiza-
tions. Recent appointments
include the following chair-
men:

San Carlos, Sacramento,
Congressman John F. Moss,
Jr., Jerry Wymore and State
Senator Albert S. Rodda, Sis-

William Lavagnino, San Juan
Bautista, firm, and Eu-
gene Carbone, Hollister busi-
ness man.

announced in the wake of a
tiff between Kent and As-
sembly Speaker Jesse M.
Unruh.

Kent had charged that Un-
ruh persuaded a dozen mem-
bers of the California delega-
tion at Atlantic City to vote
against seating the Mississip-
pi Freedom delegation at the
Democratic National Conven-
tion.

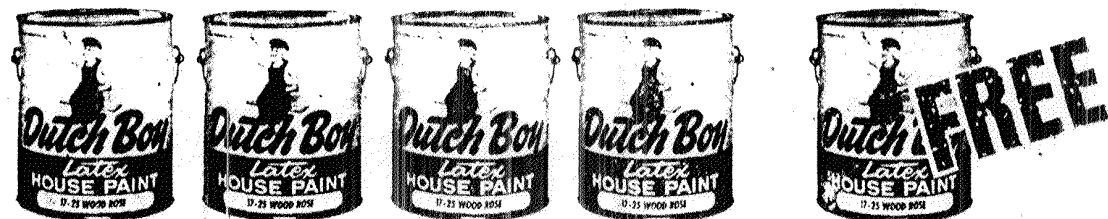
Governor Brown and the
