A \$36.5 billion disaster aid package is headed to the Senate, after the House passed what lawmakers call an installment payment to deal with the nation's emergencies.

Engine Emission Defect and Recall Reports

Notice of the EPA announces the submission of a revised information collection request to the OMB regarding engine emission defect information reports (DIRs) and voluntary emission recall reports (VERRs). The collection addresses requirements for manufacturers of heavy-duty highway and nonroad engines to submit DIRs (Form 5900-301) if emission-related defects that may cause the engines' emissions to exceed Clean Air Act standards are found on engines of the same model year. The collection also addresses requirements for manufacturers to submit VERRs (Form 5900-300) to initiate a voluntary recall and voluntary emissions recall quarterly progress reports (Form 5900-302). The revisions address the reduction in estimated respondent burden hours due to a correction on previous estimates and a significant reduction in the estimated number of respondents. ### Louisiana SIP/VOCs and Stage II Vapor Recovery

Final rule of the EPA approves revisions to the Louisiana SIP regarding control of volatile organic compounds and the Stage II vapor recovery program. The revisions exempt from Stage II vapor recovery requirements facilities used exclusively for the initial fueling and/or refueling of vehicles equipped with onboard refueling vapor recovery. The revisions also provide an exemption from the submerged fill pipe provisions for a limited number of tanks at a specific facility. In addition, the revisions address notifications to the Louisiana Department of Environmental Quality and due dates for reporting regarding VOC loading, marine vapor recovery, and specified incinerators. ### NESHAP for Wool Fiberglass Manufacturing

**AIR**

Proposed rule of the EPA would revise the NESHAP for the wool fiberglass manufacturing source category. The rule would readopt existing emission limits for formaldehyde, establish emission limits for methanol, and establish a work practice standard for phenol emissions from bonded rotary spin (RS) lines at wool fiberglass manufacturing facilities. The rule also would require cooling emissions to be included in incinerator operating limits from RS and flame attenuation (FA) lines. In addition, the rule would establish three subcategories of FA lines based on recent information indicating that there are technical or design differences that distinguish sources that utilize FA lines. Finally, the rule would set work practice standards for phenol from a newly

Proposed rule of the EPA would approve portions of a revision to the New York SIP regarding Cross-State Air Pollution Rule (CSAPR) federal trading programs. The revisions replace default allowance allocations of the federal trading programs for annual nitrogen oxide (NOx) and sulfur dioxide emissions for the state's large electric generating units for the control periods in 2017 and beyond with state-determined allocations. The revisions leave the corresponding CSAPR federal implementation plans and all other provisions of the trading programs in place.
